U.S. 'Optimistic' Over American POW's

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Sen. John L. McClellan (D-Ark) reported today the State Department "is still optimistic" about prospects for freeing American prisoners in China.

"Whether that optimism is justified, I'm not prepared to say," he added.

Eisenhower Recommends Award for Salk

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 18 (AP)—President Eisenhower today invited Dr. Jonas Salk to the White House Friday and recommended the discoverer of polio vaccine be given a proposed distinguished civilian achievement award.

James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, said legislation to authorize such a new award—"the highest our nation could give"—will be introduced in both the Senate and the House this week.

Truman Advises Ike to Use UN More

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—Ex-President Truman declared today the United Nations has staved off "unlimited international warfare" in the past ten years. He called on the Eisenhower administration to make more use of the world organization and to lay before its General Assembly "the current threats to world peace."

Irag Dims Red Spotlight

BANDUNG, Indonesia, April 18 (AP) — Pro-Western statesmen seized the spotlight from Red China's Chou En-lai today in the opening speeches at the Asian-African conference.

Foreign Minister Fadhil Jamali of Iraq led the way. He called communism a new form of colonialism that breeds hatred among peoples.

Amid the cheers and applause for Jamali's statement there was stony-faced silence on the part of Communists and neutralists in the East-West controversy.

Ike Gets Carrier Report

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP)—A presidential advisory committee recommended today that the government relax its control of the transportation industry to allow greater competition among railroads, airlines, truckers, and water carriers.

Greater reliance on "competitive forces in rate-making" was declared by the Transportation Policy Committee to be the "cornerstone of a modernized regulatory program."
