The group awards a scholarship cup to the member showing the greatest improvement in her All-University average from one se-mester to another. The cup is awarded at the Founder's Day Banquet.


An outstanding pledge is rec-ognized at the Pledge Dance in the Fall, and the outstanding senior is honored at the senior party in May.
