Debaters Selected For Cambridge Meet

Jonathan Plaut, manager of the men's debate team, and Edward Klevans, a member of the team, have been selected to represent the University in the annual international debate tournament with Cambridge University.

The debate will be held at 7 p.m. Nov. 1 in 121 Sparks. Admission will be free.

Each year two representatives of a foreign country are chosen to come to America by the American National Institute of Education and foreign education associations.

England and India Represented
Last year England was also represented by Oxford University and the year before members of Bombay University and Rajputana University represented India.

This year the international debaters will speak on the national debate topic: "Resolved: That the non-agricultural industries of the United States should guarantee their employees an annual wage."

This topic was decided upon after a list of 10 possible topics was submitted by Cambridge.

Foreigners Chosen
The English delegates are K. W. Post and J. G. York, both graduates of Cambridge.

Post is a graduate student in archeology and an amateur actor. He plans to enter politics after his education is completed. York is a 26-year-old lawyer who has been active in the British labor movement.

They arrived in the United States on Oct. 4 and the University will be the fourth school they will visit. They have visited the University of Pennsylvania, Princeton University, and Columbia University.

Selected by Coach
Plaut and Klevans were chosen by J. F. O'Brien, professor of public speaking.

Plaut is a junior in industrial engineering from Rockville Centre, N.Y. and Klevans is a junior in electrical engineering from Roaring Spring.

The Cambridge debaters will take the affirmative side of the topic and the University repre-

sentatives will debate the negative side.

Each debater will make a 15-minute constructive speech giving his plan, case, and the arguments which support his case.

Then one member of each of the two teams will give a one minute speech in rebuttal attacking the other team's case and arguments.

The event will not be judged.

Heschel Will Present Fifth Centennial Lecture on Religion

Rabbi Abraham J. Heschel, internationally-known scholar, will present the fifth in a series of Centennial lectures on religion at 8 p.m. Monday in 121 Sparks.

His topic will be "Faith in the Realness of God."

Rabbi Heschel, associate professor of Jewish mysticism and philosophy, Jewish Theological Seminary of America, New York, N.Y., is widely known as a scholar, author and lecturer.

Born in Warsaw in 1907, he received his early training in Jewish education. At the age of 20, he left Warsaw to attend the University of Berlin, where he was awarded the doctor of philosophy degree five years later.

In 1927, Dr. Heschel published in German his first major works, "Maimonides," and "Die Prophetie."

From 1932-33, he served as instructor in Talmud at a large Jewish school in Berlin. Four years later he became the successor to the Jewish mystic, Martin Buber, in the Frankfurt Lehr-

haus, an adult education school. With the rise of Nazism, Dr. Heschel returned to Warsaw, where he taught for a year. He then went to London where he established the Institute for Jewish Learning, a center for prominent Jewish scholars.

Dr. Heschel came to the United States in 1940, where he served for five years as associate professor of philosophy and rabbinics at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, O. In 1945 he joined the faculty of the Jewish Seminary of America, his present position today.

His latest book, "Man's Quest for God," was published in 1954. He was also a recipient of a Guggenheim award for 1954-55.
