John G. York of the affirmative explained that labor asks for a 5 to 7-cent average hourly increase in wages per year, and this could be put in the GAW fund. Klevans pointed out that this would cause inflation because employers would raise their prices in order to pay for the GAW. York explained that inflation is too much money chasing too many goods, and that GAW would not create such a situation. Plaut claimed that a GAW would hurt the small businesses and thus crowd out the competitors. York explained that the GAW should be tailored to suit the particular industries.

The affirmative repeatedly asked for an alternative plan to take the place of a guaranteed annual wage. The negative replied that the debate was on the GAW and not on an alternative plan.

Post is a laborite and York is a conservative who will take his bar exams in May. It was erroneously reported in yesterday's Collegian that York was a lawyer and a member of the labor party.

Howard P. Zelko, professor of public speaking, chaired the debate.

12 amendments to the Taft-Hartley Act which tended to liberalize the act. He said he felt the amendments to be "sound."

Speaking on the New Deal, Mitchell said the Eisenhower administration is concerned with the individual as an individual, not as "the common man" in a mass. He said the hand of the government plays lightly on the economy.

All-University President Earl Seely presented Mitchell with a replica of the Nittany Lion on behalf of the student body and the student government.
