At that moment, the Lindes car, was traveling in the south-bound lane. The head-on collis-ion occurred in the southbound lane after Steinhauer's vehicle swerved out of control. Stein-hauer received head injuries and multiple cuts.

Troopers reported that Stein-hauer will be charged with reckless driving.
