George Sullivan, Beaver House, won his second straight match in the 165-lb, division, copping a unanimous decision from Alpha Chi Sigma's Jack Bash. Sullivan earlier had beaten John Wagner of Theta Delta Chi.

Although Sullivan gained the decision by a unanimous vote from the judges, he was in trouble a great part of the match.
