

# 6 Colleges Will Lose AFROTC

Five colleges in Massachusetts and Columbia University will lose their Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps units, the New York Times stated yesterday.

Amherst College, Tufts University, and Lowell Technological Institute have been added to a cessation list already including Harvard University and Williams College.

Col. Daniel F. Riva, professor of air science, has announced that the University was not one of the colleges confirmed in the Pentagon's report on affected institutions.

The Times said that more than 20 colleges and universities in the country would discontinue their AFROTC programs at the end of the 1956-57 academic year. They were not producing enough pilot-grade officers to justify the expense, the Air Force has said.

Col. Riva said Wednesday that the order affects only small colleges and those either not producing enough graduate officers or those with indifferent instruction programs. Land-grant colleges and universities have had no trouble in meeting their graduate quotas, he said.

Approximately 155 students graduate from the University each year. About 100 of them are eligible for pilot training, he said.

The Senate Committee on Student Affairs subcommittee on discipline decided yesterday to extend the sentence of disciplinary probation recommended by Tribunal Tuesday for Peter Krall to include having a notation of the incident placed on his record.

Tribunal had recommended disciplinary probation for Krall, senior in animal husbandry from Catasauqua, with the stipulation that a notation not be placed on his record because of his seventh semester standing.

However, the subcommittee felt that such action would be inconsistent with usual procedure in cases of disciplinary probation.

Krall may petition to have himself removed from disciplinary probation during his eighth semester, and thus remove the notation.

Krall was called before Tribunal for having left the scene of an accident in which he was involved Nov. 13.
