Yale Professor Will Address Chapel Service

The Rev. Dr. Julian N. Hartt, of the Yale University Divinity School, will speak at chapel services in Schwab Auditorium at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow. His subject will be: "What's In It For Me?"

The chapel service program will include the anthem, "Behold, the Tabernacle of God," by Willan. For the prelude, George E. Ceiga, organist, will play "Picardy"—from Meditation on Communion Hymns by Leo Sowerby, and for the Postlude, "Fugue in B minor" by Healey Willan.

Dr. Hartt, who is Noah Porter Professor of Philosophical Theology and Director of Professional Studies at the Yale University Divinity School, has been on the Yale faculty since 1943.

Born in Selby, S.D., Dr. Hartt received his B.A. from Dakota Wesleyan University. He received his B.D. degree from Garrett Biblical Institute, his M.A. from Northwestern University, and his Ph.D. from Yale in 1940. He is a Fellow of the National Council on Religion in Higher Education.

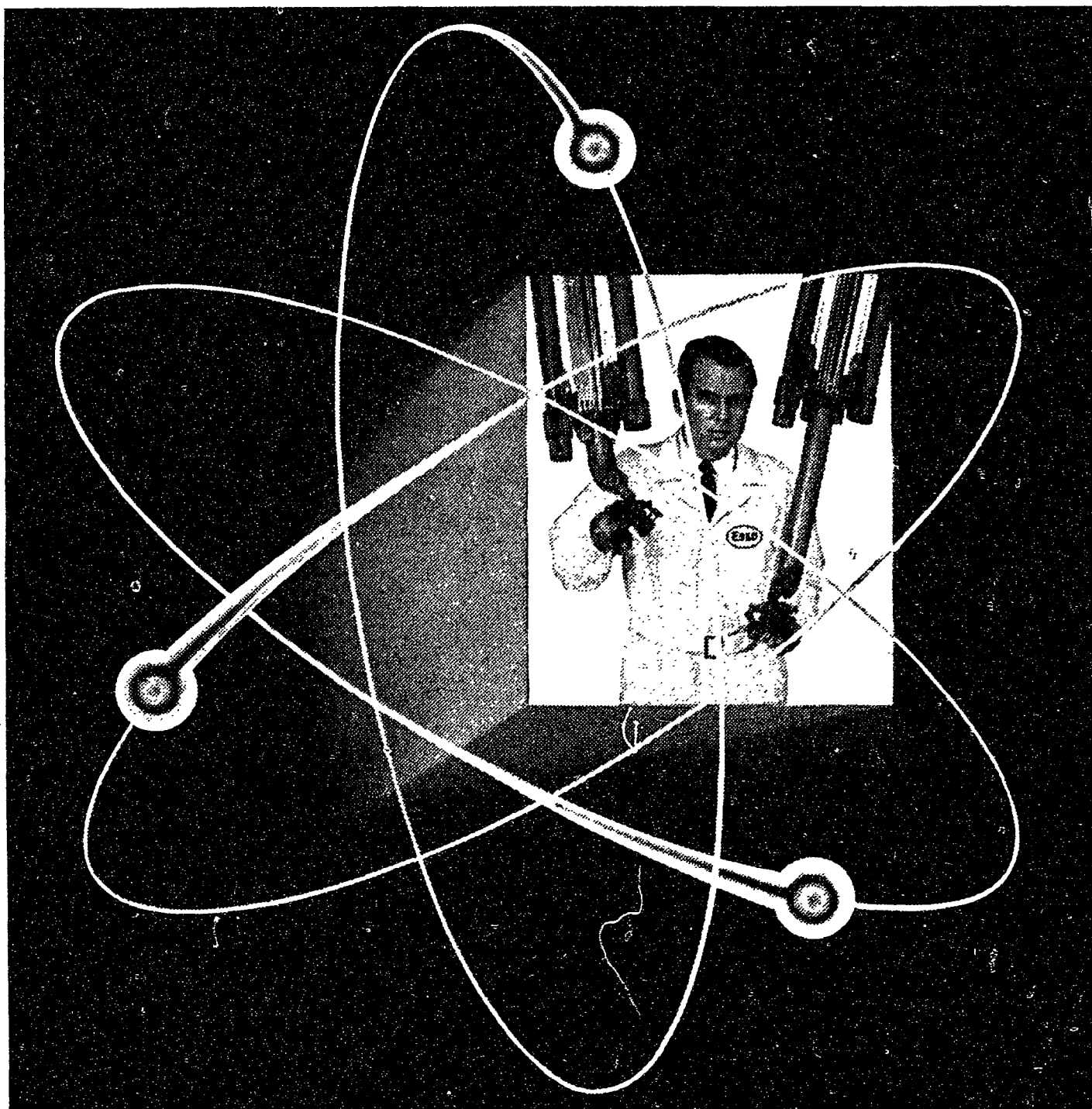
