BusAd Council Sets Election Vote Procedure

The Business Administration Council voted last night to have two voting desks for council elections on March 21 and 22.

One desk will be placed in the lobby of Sparks and the other in the television room of the Hetzel Union building.

LeRoy Harris, senior in business administration from Pittsburgh, was appointed chairman of the spring elections committee by James Ginsberg, president of the council. William Nelson, sophomore in business administration from Ridgeway, and Harry Neuman, junior in business administration from Philadelphia were appointed his assistants.

The council decided to invite 50 underprivileged children to their children's party which will be held from 4 to 5:30 p.m. March 27 in the Hetzel Union ballroom.

The council discussed the idea of raising the required average for the honorable mention list in the BusAd Bulletin from 3.0 to 3.2.

The BusAd-Bulletin will come out the week of March 14. The personalities for the issue are Joseph Hayes, senior in business administration from Philadelphia, and Nancy Blaha, senior in business administration from Crafton. The professor of the issue is Dr. Monroe Newman, assistant professor of economics.

Council Sets Evaluation Of Courses

The Physical Education Council selected 6 of its members to meet with a faculty committee to discuss recommendations about course overspecialization.

The students who will represent the council are John Zerbe, senior; Carolyn Briggs, sophomore; Merion Lafferty, senior; Sally Cushman, junior; Robert McMullen, senior; and Ann Farrell, junior.

These representatives will meet Sunday at 7 p.m. in the Hetzel Union building to organize the suggestions submitted at the past two council meetings which involve specific courses and their addition or removal from the physical education curriculum.

Council elections will be held March 20 and 21.

President Dean Mullen, appointed Carolyn Briggs, sophomore; Nancy Hutchinson, freshman; Ralph Cryder, junior; and Zerbe as members of the nominating committee.

This group will select a president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer. They must have a minimum All-University average of 2.30 and the president must have one year of service on the council.

In addition to the council officers each class will select two boys and two girls to represent them, and six organizations of the colleges will select their representative. These representatives must have a minimum All-University average of 2.0.

Students may make self nominations by obtaining 15 signatures on a petition for their nomination.

Ann Farrell, junior in physical education, made a motion subject to faculty approval that students of the college be allowed to vote on whether they would like to have physical education student convocations next year.

It was suggested that this item be included on the ballot for next year's council members.

The next convocation is Tuesday March 20 at 11 a.m. in the assembly hall of the Hetzel Union building. The speaker will be Albert R. Blakeslee, Associated Press science writer.

Referring to the death of a pledge at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Bullock said "our job is to make sure nothing like this happens at the University."

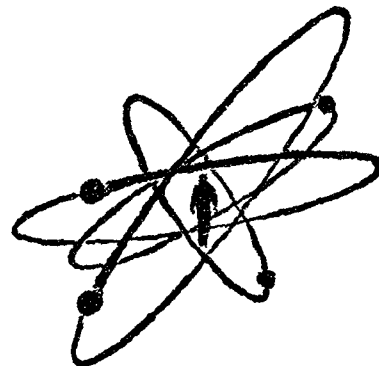
Bus Ad Student Council Will Hold Convocation
