(Continued from page one) vide a way for students to go out and try to find ways to spend money unnecessarily.

The Campus party candidate proposed a plan which would involve a committee to allocate scholarships to worthy students. The committee, composed of members of the administration and students, would decide if an application for a scholarship was justified and act accordingly. If the committee approved the application, it would also decide how much financial aid to grant to the student.

Bahrenburg said that in this way student leaders would receive financial aid much the same way as students who represent the University in fields of academic and athletic achievement. Speaking on the parking problem which exists at the University, Bahrenburg said, "Cabinet's action Thursday night did not prove the problem doesn't exist. It definitely does. However, a long range program to alleviate

the problem does exist, and the administration is doing its best with the problem."

"I do feel that student government should stay in the middle of the thing," Bahrenburg said. Johnson said an immediate program should be instituted, possibly in the form of a temporary parking lot behind Nittany dormitories.

Both candidates agreed that the All-University constitution needs to be revamped. Bahrenburg pointed out the need for a judicial chain of command to make the Supreme Court an appellate court only. The court now has original jurisdiction.

Johnson believed that, although the Cabinet Personal Interviewing Committee is doing a good job, "something should be done to keep capable individuals from being pushed aside."

The two candidates agreed that returning the National Student Association was a good move, and that NSA would benefit the University as a whole because it provides an exchange of ideas.

Schriger Elected LA Council Head

Richard Schriger, junior in labor management from Rockville Centre, N.Y., has been elected president of Liberal Arts Student Council.
