Voting continues today from 8:30 a.m. until 7 p.m. in the card room in the Hetzel Union building. Today's deadline had been scheduled for 5:30 p.m.

208 Seniors Vote

A breakdown of the voting shows that the seniors, who voted only for the All-University officer, except in the case of males who were eligible to vote for the Athletic Association officers, had the lowest turnout, 208.

Sophomores were highest with 518, juniors next with 444, and freshmen third with 405.

All students are eligible to vote for the three All-University positions. Sixth and seventh semester students may vote for senior class officers, and fourth and fifth semester students may vote for junior class officers. Third semester students will vote only for All-University officers. Only male students are eligible to vote for AA officers.

Last year a total of 1868 students voted the opening day. The record for opening-day balloting, established two years ago, is 2119.

Only 3679 of the 9984 eligible students, a percentage of 37.7, cast their ballots in last year's two-day elections. A 50 per cent goal has been set by the Elections Committee for this year.
