

Perkins Asks for Probe On FMA Buying Methods

The members of the Fraternity Marketing Association were urged last night to investigate their buying methods which are allowing 45 per cent of the fraternity business to slip away to non-FMA-approved vendors.

Harold W. Perkins, assistant dean of men and president of the FMA board of trustees, told the annual meeting of the group that the FMA buying power could be greatly increased if contracts with FMA-approved vendors were entirely fulfilled.

This was one of the main problems outlined by Perkins in his president's report. Other problems included additional membership, new categories, and making the workings of FMA known around the campus.

In addition to the problems, Perkins cited the progress made by the association in the past year. He noted that the business volume had increased 27 per cent over the previous year.

It was reported by Secretary-Treasurer Robert Emmers that as of March 15 the association had made purchases totaling \$103,000. He added that it was expected that this total would go as high as \$150,000 by the end of the year. Last year FMA did a business of \$120,000.

Perkins said that last year FMA realized a savings of \$5500 by its discounts. If the group had a membership of 50 fraternities, Perkins said, this saving could have been increased to around \$17,000.

Perkins also said the board has been discussing the idea of getting a part-time or full-time manager to handle all the financial matters of the association. Under the present operating situation, the volume of business and the savings realized would not permit paying the salary of such a manager.

The Membership Committee reported that three fraternities had dropped membership and six new members had been taken in during the past year.

Seven new members of the Board of Trustees were elected at the meeting. Student members are John Lengenecker, Bernard Resnick, Glen Thierwechter, and David Hamrick.

Theodore D. Richards Jr., assistant professor of agriculture extension, Thomas Hammonds, general extension editor, and Ronald A. Barton, assistant professor of forestry, were elected as alumni members.

The sixth annual Editor's Seminar will be held April 12 and 13, at the University, with "Health, Education and Welfare," as the main topic of discussion.

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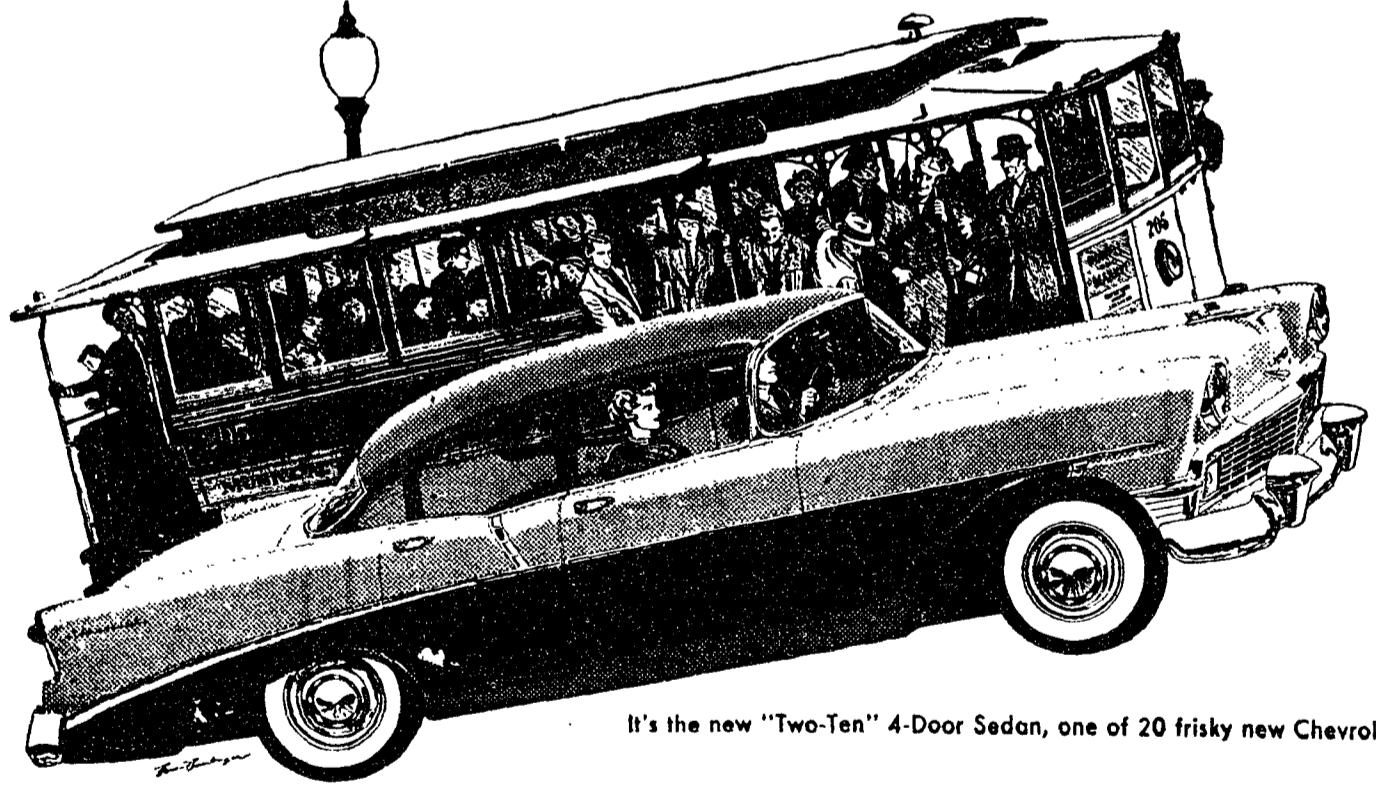
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
