

Aspaturian Writes Magazine Article

An article entitled "Mr. Molotov Nears the End of the Road" by Dr. Vernon B. Aspaturian, assistant professor of political science, appeared in the April 5 issue of The Reporter, a news magazine.

The article tells how Russia's foreign minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov is quietly and undramatically reaching the end of his political life.

Dr. Aspaturian describes Molotov as "always reserved, self-assured, impervious to all attempts to ruffle his stony composure—is the master of his emotions, a clever manipulator of the passions of others and himself the victim of none."

"The indications that Molotov is on the skids are certain, Dr. Aspaturian said.

Indications Listed

He listed some of these indications as his confession in the journal, Kommunist; the attack on him by Pravda, Communist party newspaper; and his remark last May that it was time for "younger blood."

Dr. Aspaturian has published numerous articles on the theory and practice of Soviet federalism.

He came to the University in 1952 after a tour of service as chief of the Russian desk in the Psychological Warfare Section of the United Nations General Headquarters, Far East Command.

CPA Senior Board Refuses All-University Compensations

The Central Promotion Agency senior board has voted unanimously not to accept monetary compensations from All-University Cabinet if offered.

The board is being considered for compensations by the Cabinet Committee on Compensations as a result of a motion by Douglas Moorhead, retiring president of the Athletic Association, at the pre-

Easter vacation Cabinet meeting.

CPA was not included in the original list of organizations receiving compensations when it was approved by Cabinet in February.

Sandford Lichenstein, CPA director, said that the organization would function better if it were not a Cabinet committee. He said neither CPA nor Cabinet would benefit by an affiliation. CPA is not tied closely enough to Cabinet to accept any compensations, he said.

CPA also approved a motion at its Wednesday meeting to become independent of Cabinet. It too was an unanimous vote.

Lichenstein said that CPA is a non-profit service organization designed to aid any student group with its advertising and promotional work.
