

'The Lady's Not for Burning' Opens Tonight at Center Stage

A mixture of fancism and humor will be presented at Center Stage tonight as a lovely enchantress tries to save her life from those who believe she is a witch.

"The Lady's Not for Burning," Player's last Center Stage production for this year, will open at 8 p.m. tonight. It will run every Friday and Saturday night through May 19.

The play, by Christopher Fry, is in light verse and is considered typical of the British high comedy. Warren S. Smith, associate professor of theater arts, will direct the show.

Although it is a modern play and was first produced in England in 1950, "The Lady's Not for Burning" is based on 15th century English life. John Geilgud and Pan' a Brown played the leading roles when the play was produced on Broadway.

The central plot of the story revolves around the love story of a woman who has been accused of being a witch and a young man who says he wants to be hanged and claims he is a murderer. Much of the action centers around the witch hunt.

The young enchantress got a reputation as a witch partly because she lived alone, and partly because her father had been an alchemist. When the witch hunters come seeking her she leaves home and goes to live with the town mayor.

It is at the home of the mayor that she meets and falls in love with the man who claims he is a murderer and desires to be hanged.

She is convicted of being a witch, and her young lover tries to save her life by maintaining that he is the Devil himself.

Several of the characters in the play are almost cartoons. These typed people include the town mayor, the town justice, and the absent-minded chaplain. The mayor's two nephews have many times been called hellions.

Smith said that he is using one of the most inexperienced cases he has worked for a Player's production. Even, he said, many of the leads are new people.

Harvard Prof To Present Priestley Talks

Dr. George B. Kistiakowsky, professor of physical chemistry at Harvard University, will be the speaker for the annual Priestley lecture series to be held Monday through Friday.

He will speak at 8 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, at 5:15 p.m. Thursday, and at 10 a.m. Friday. The lectures will be in 119 Osmond.

The series, jointly sponsored by Phi Lambda Upsilon, chemistry recognition society, and the departments of chemistry and chemical engineering, are given each year to commemorate the birthday of Joseph Priestley, scientist and theologian and the discoverer of oxygen. The series was established in 1927.

Dr. Kistiakowsky is widely known for his work in the fields of kinetics of gas phase reactions, structure of polystyomic molecules, thermochemistry of organic compounds, enzyme catalyzed reactions, and explosives and explosions.

He received his doctor's degree from the University of Berlin, and was later appointed to the Princeton faculty.

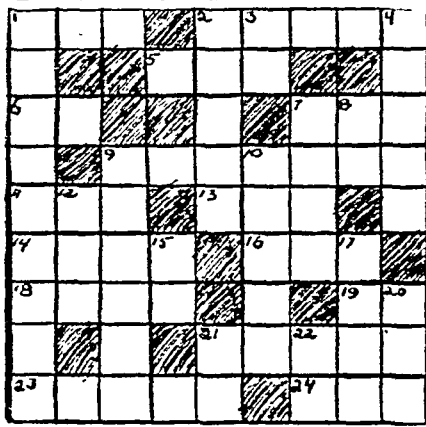
