

Cabinet Approves Encampment Report

All-University Cabinet last night approved an Encampment Committee report which included preliminary procedure for the 1956 Student Encampment to be held Sept. 5 to 8 at the Mont Alto Center.

Cole Appoints Three to UCA Race Committee

Robert Cole, Town Independent Men president, announced the appointment of three students Tuesday to serve on the University Christian Association committee on race relations.

Norman Hedding, William Norman, and Raymond David, TIM representatives at large to the Association of Independent Men Board of Governors, received the appointments.

Inspects Rooming Houses

The committee of race relations, headed by Gertrude Winsenberger, graduate student in German from Rochester, N.Y., is endeavoring to make an investigation of town rooming houses to determine which ones will accept Negro and foreign students.

Charles Heinly, Richard Norton, Raymond David, Imerio Matos, James Tipton and Cole will serve on a committee to compose a list of town rooming houses containing eight or more students.

List to Aid Firemen

Cole said the list will enable Alpha firemen to complete inspection of town rooming houses.

James Goodwin announced his resignation as TIM parliamentarian Tuesday. Harry Martini, junior class president, will serve as interim parliamentarian.

Donald Reidenbaugh, emphasized that this year the committee will give more consideration to freshmen and sophomore applicants than has been done in the past.

Reasons for this, Reidenbaugh said, are that approximately 85 per cent of the students attending this by position will be seniors. He said this means if more freshmen and sophomores are permitted to attend Encampment, they will be able to put the experience to work in the two or three years they have remaining in student government.

Interviews for those not chosen by position will begin May 9, and will continue until the end of the semester. A maximum of 120 persons will attend the Encampment. This group will be made up of approximately 90 students and 30 representatives from the faculty, administration, and townspeople.

Reidenbaugh's report listed eight tentative workshops. They are Penn State's Future 1960-70; Counseling (Resident, Orientation, Academic); Academic Policies; Communications; Social Culture, and Recreational Programs; Campus Political Organizations; Making Student Government More Effective; and Regulations and Controls.

It was added that this list is not yet definite, and that topics for discussion in the various workshops are presently being compiled by the committee from the results of the poll sent to participants.

The list of attendants by position had been previously presented to Cabinet by the committee chairman.
