

GOP, Dems Stage Drive For Heavy Primary Vote

PHILADELPHIA, April 23 (AP)—Both major parties made a last-minute drive today to encourage a heavy "popularity contest" vote for President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Adlai Stevenson in Pennsylvania's primary election tomorrow.

Republican and Democratic state organizations urged county leaders to push the preference balloting for their respective presidential favorites.

Red Announces Great Range Future Missiles

BIRMINGHAM, England, April 23 (AP)—Nikita Khrushchev told the world today Soviet Russia soon will have hydrogen-bomb guided missiles "which can hit every point in the world."

And to those who belittle or jeer the Soviet Union, the Communist party boss declared: "never shake your fist at a Russian."

Voice Rises
Khrushchev's face reddened and his voice rose in a speech before a Chamber of Commerce luncheon. He had just been through a whirlwind tour of Birmingham, Britain's Pittsburgh, in which he and Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin were met by heckling demonstrators and banners saying "Down with Moscow."

He and Bulganin were guests of honor at the luncheon on this sixth day of their 10-day visit to Britain, which they call a goodwill mission.

Says Red's Can Compete
The guided missile reference came as Khrushchev tried to illustrate that the Soviet Union is geared to compete on any level with the Allied West. He spoke extemporaneously and in Russian through an interpreter.

"The point I want to make is that restrictions of trade do not prevent us in any way from making advances in armament," he told the civic leaders in the heart of Britain's industrial belt.

Criminals Brought in U.S.

NEW YORK, April 23 (AP)—A federal official claimed today that thousands of criminal and misfit Latin Americans have been brought to this country as slaves on a vice ring. Faked passports were used.

Officers to Be Elected

Officers of the Engineering Student Council will be elected at 7 p.m. tonight in 106 Osmond.

Eisenhower, in effect, was unopposed on the GOP ballot. The name of Sen. William F. Knowland (R-Calif.) appeared only because he was unable to withdraw it before the deadline.

Stevenson's will be the only presidential candidate name on the Democratic ballot, with Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) avoiding any outward attempt to gain a write-in vote in the state.

No Statewide Battles
With no battles for statewide offices to speak of and the national convention delegations due to start the nomination balloting unpledged, the GOP and Democratic leaders concentrated on the presidential preference race. Each side hoped to rack up an impressive showing.

But voters cannot cross party lines in a Pennsylvania primary and Republicans have a 450,000 edge over Democrats in registration.

50 Per Cent Turnout Expected
Some strategists looked for well under a 50 per cent voter turnout.

In the 1952 presidential election Eisenhower carried Pennsylvania by a 269,520 margin over Stevenson—2,415,789 to 2,149,269.

In the 1952 primary, Eisenhower polled 863,785 Republican votes and received 28,660 Democratic write-in votes. He ran better than 7-1 ahead of his two strongest nomination opponents, Harold E. Stassen and Sen. Robert A. Taft.

Dulles Calls for NATO Change From Military
NEW YORK, April 23 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today the time has come to develop the North Atlantic Treaty Organization into something more than a purely military instrument.

He did not pinpoint his ideas beyond mention of "more independence . . . more economic development . . . more sense of equality and human brotherhood."

"Our new task is to build more on hope and less on fear," Dulles told the annual luncheon of The Associated Press, worldwide cooperative organization to gather and distribute news.

Expert Cites Inaccuracy Of Rocket

MUNICH, Germany, April 23 (AP)—A top guided missile expert said today that despite feverish activity in worldwide research, it is unlikely a high-powered intercontinental rocket can be made accurate enough for "guaranteed" push button warfare.

Claims Chances for Error
Not that there won't be monstrous, death-dealing transoceanic rockets, said Dr. Theodore von Karman of Paris. It's just that there are too many chances for error to build a rocket that could be guaranteed to land plunk in the middle of a target.

Von Karman gave his views in an interview during the world's first international conference on guided missile development. It is being held under the auspices of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Rocket Inaccurate
Actually, Von Karman said, the celebrated German V2 rocket of World War II wasn't very accurate.

"It smashed a lot of houses in London, which was uncomfortable for the residents," he said, "but it was no great military accomplishment."

UN Official Faces Frontier Problem

DAMASCUS, Syria, April 23 (AP)—United Nations Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold today plunged into what may be the most complex frontier problem that he will face on his Middle East mission.

The secretary general flew here after a chain of successes in his talks with Egyptian, Israeli and Lebanese leaders in his efforts to eliminate border shootings which have carried a threat of outright war.

German Plotters Start New Party

BONN, Germany, April 23 (AP)—Rebel members of the Free Democratic party FDP today founded a new "Free People's party" to cooperate with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

The new party is certain to be included in Adenauer's present pro-Western coalition, made up of his Christian Democratic Union (CDU) and the German party (DP). The Free Democratic party once belonged to the coalition, but dropped out in a disagreement over foreign policy.

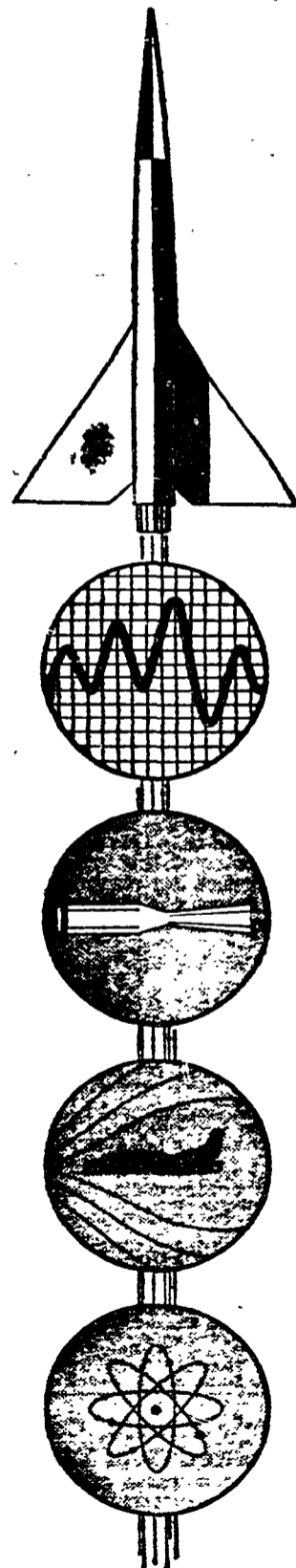
