

2 SAE's Slept Near Burglar

Two members of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity slept through the Monday burglary, in which about \$1200 in personal items and cash were stolen about 25 feet from where the person or persons made entry to the Beaver avenue and Pugh street house.

The two members had been studying in the downstairs living room until they turned out the lights and dozed on couches at about 3 a.m., according to Merl Gerdes, house president.

Department Asks \$10,000 For Library

The department of history has voted unanimously to request an annual library budget of \$10,000, representing an increase of \$8500 over last year's budget.

The request has been sent to Ralph W. McComb, University librarian, and has not yet been officially approved.

The department is allocated \$1500 a year for its library budget, but it has been spending more than three times this amount for books for the past few years.

To Aid Research
The increased amount of money will help to build better library facilities to make more research possible by faculty and graduate students.

The money will also be used to buy more books for outside reading, which students are required to do for history.

To Buy Files
The category of material to be bought also includes long run files of more newspapers, long run files of professional journals, and source collections of various nations and states of the United States.

Source collections are a combination of eye witness accounts and official documents, which relate to important historical events showing what actually happened. The increased library facilities will enable the members of the history department to carry on better and more thorough research projects.

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Research Shows Snow in April Not So Unusual

Although students have been complaining about the snowy, cold weather of late, its not as unusual as they may think.

A check of the department of meteorology weather books shows that the University has had snow up to or beyond April 20 for six out of the last ten years.

On Mothers Day Weekend, May 10, 1953, two inches of snow fell in Nittany Valley to set a record for the last flurry during the 10-year period.

It looks as if the students this year will be spared of such a final ending to winter. Warmer temperatures and clearing skies is the forecast for today.

However, students in the department of meteorology said it is too early to be optimistic.

The high forecast today is 52 degrees while a low of 33 is expected. Yesterday's high was 41 and the low was 29. About .05 inches of precipitation fell.

Although they were only 25 feet from the dining room window, where entry was gained, there was a closed door between them and the dining room, Gerdes said.

State College Police, who were called to the scene soon after the burglary was discovered at 6 a.m. by a group of pledges, are still investigating the breaking and entering.

Meticulous Burglars
Gerdes said the burglars or burglars "sure were meticulous." He said in one incident someone removed a scarf from atop a cigar box, opened the cigar box, took out a wallet, removed money from the wallet, replaced the wallet, shut the box, and put the scarf back on top.

Gerdes believes the burglary was the work of vandals. He said this seems to be the only explanation for someone going to the trouble of standing on a chair and removing a bull whip fastened to the wall.

NROTC Hat Taken
And Richard James, house treasurer, would like to know what they wanted with his Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps hat. Also stolen were five or six membership pins and a pledge pin.

All but four of the 20 rooms in the three-story stone structure were looted. The highest amount of cash stolen from one member, according to Gerdes, was \$40. Another member had \$30 stolen. These, he said, were the only sizeable amounts.

The robbery, according to James, probably took place sometime after 3:30 a.m. since a member was sleeping in one of the looted rooms until that time.

Done by Several
Capt. John R. Juba, State College police chief, said yesterday that it was probably the work of several persons since "in all they took a lot of stuff."

He further said it was probably the work of someone familiar with the fraternity's dormitory-like sleeping arrangements. All study rooms which were looted, are situated on the second floor, while the members sleep on the third floor.

Police are also investigating a car vandalism at Alpha Epsilon Pi fraternity. It happened at about the same time as the SAE robbery, police said.

Professor's Son Given 'Satisfactory' Report



The council voted that the \$100 award will be open only to students in the College of the Liberal Arts who have not received other financial aid.

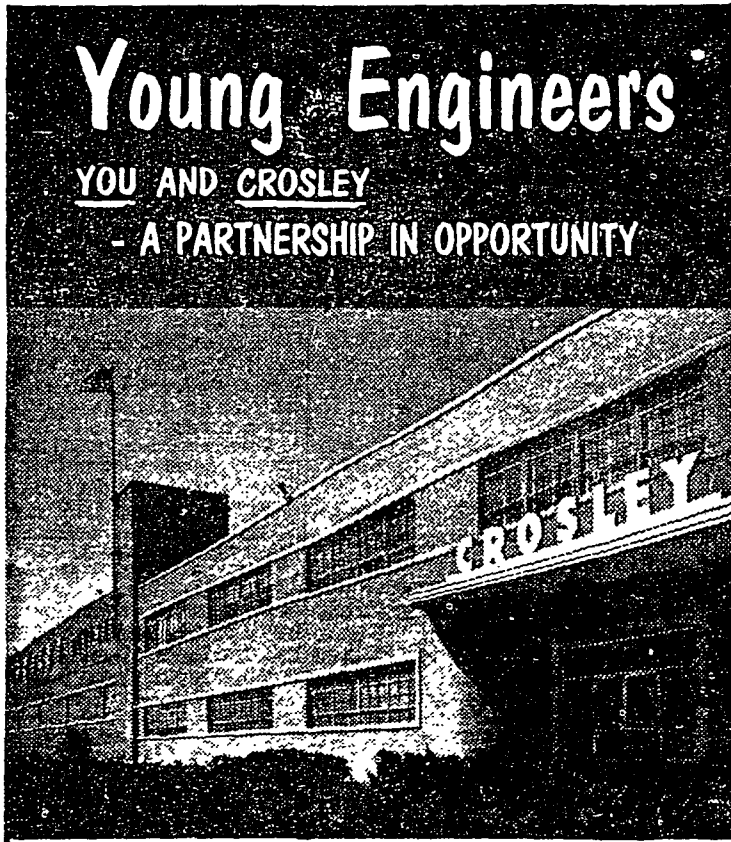
The scholarship will be awarded on the basis of need and scholastic achievement.
