

Nittany Council Elects Officers

Melvin Weaver, sophomore in industrial engineering from Temple, was elected president of Nittany Council Thursday night at an elections meeting held in Nittany 20.

Stephen Baker, freshman in mechanical engineering from Hallstead, was elected vice president. Charles Welsh, freshman in journalism from Prospect Park, was elected secretary.

The position of treasurer was left open but will be filled next semester. Frank Summerlin, president of Nittany 31, said council expressed a desire to leave a position open to next semester's incoming freshmen interested in student government.

(Continued from page one) the Governor will do about the extra million, I don't know." As approved by the House last September the appropriation totaled \$25,194,000 and covers the 1955-57 fiscal years. That figure is about \$5 million above the 1953-55 budget.

However, before the Senate unanimously approved the bill Thursday, the Senate Appropriations Committee Tuesday night tacked on the \$1 million increase.

The University spokesman said yesterday the increase was probably because the University has about 600 more students now than when President Milton S. Eisenhower requested \$25,194,000 in the fall of 1954.

The largest part—\$25,783,000—of the pending bill is earmarked for general maintenance and instruction purposes. Most of the remaining sum will be used for research.

Clover Club Meeting

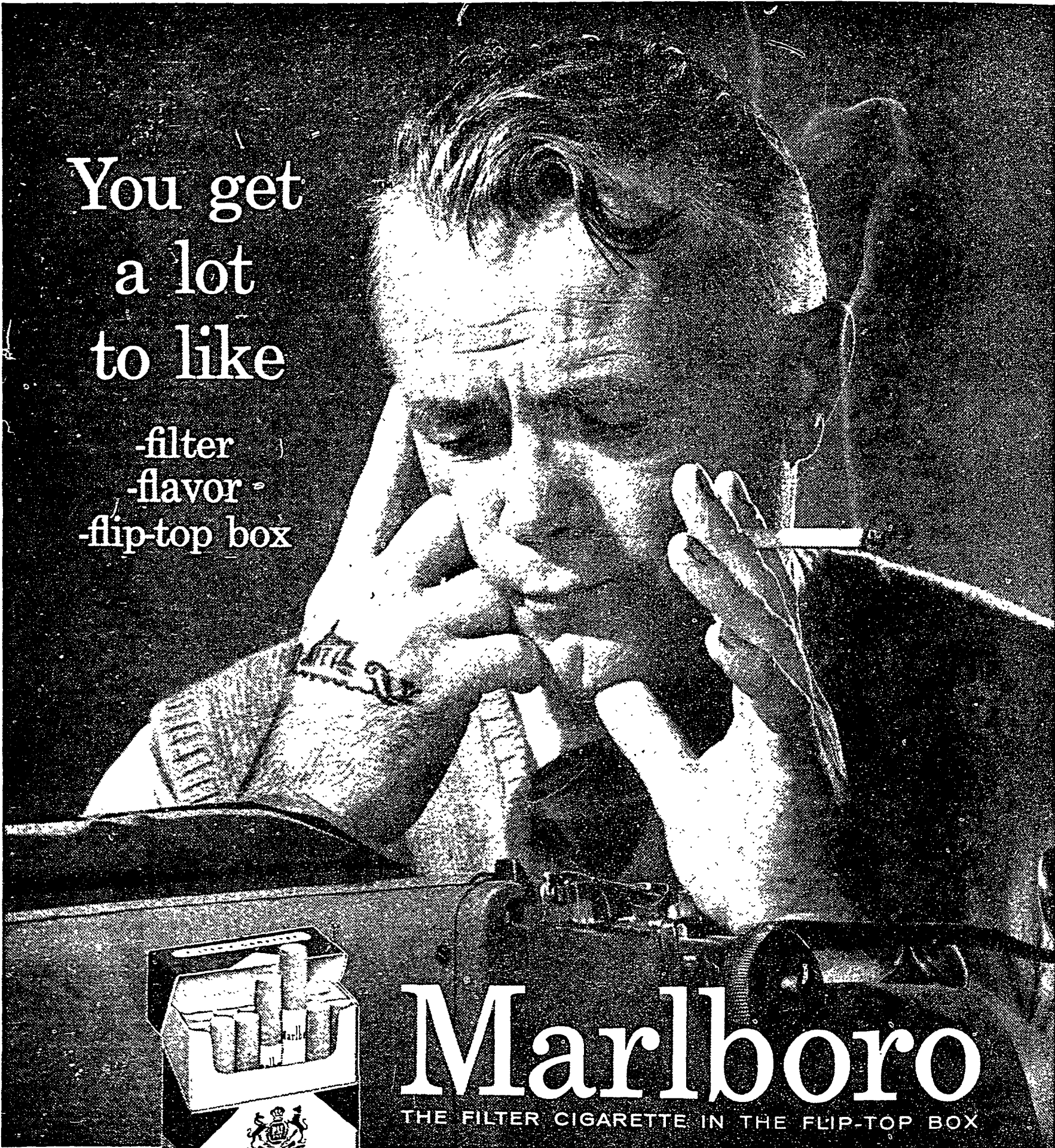
