Thalimer Is Given Rifle Award

John Thalimer, junior in electrical engineering from Pittsburgh, was awarded the General Merritt A. Edson Trophy Thursday for the highest score in the inter-service rifle match between the Army, Navy and Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets.

The award was presented by Marine Capt. Merritt A. Edson Jr. son of the late general for whom the award is named.

This is the second year the award has been given. Both times the army reserve team has won. Thalimer's score was 383.

Other members of the winning army team were Marco Marchetti, junior in Forestry from Chevy Chase, Md.; William Pickering, freshman in civil engineering from Langhorne; Charles Hayes, senior in industrial engineering from Bradford; and Daniel Thalimer, freshman in chemical engineering from Pittsburgh.

In another match held at Bradford the inter-service rifle team, composed of two army, two navy, and one air force rifleman, won fourth place. There were ten teams in the match.

William Pickering of the Army had the highest individual score. Other members of the inter-service team were James Putnam of Navy, Daniel Thalimer of Army, Wallace Hodge of Navy, and Samuel Campbell of the Air Force.

The inter-service team was coached by M/Sgt. Bernard Goebels, U.S. Army.

Dr. Kee attended Temple University and was graduated from Bryan University in Dayton, Tenn. He received his master of theology degree from Dallas, Texas Seminary, and his doctor of philosophy degree from Yale University.

Two Yale Awards

On the completion of his residence work at Yale University, Dr. Kee was awarded the two Brothers Fellowship by Yale for travel and study in the Near East.

During the years 1949 and 1950, he studied in Jerusalem, Jordan, and took part in archaeological expeditions in the Jordan Valley and at Mt. Sinai in Egypt. He was among the first Americans to visit the cave where the first of the now-famous Dead Sea Scrolls were found.

Teaches at Drew

For the past three years Dr. Kee has been assistant professor of New Testament at Drew University, where he teaches in both the Theological Seminary and the Graduate school. Earlier, Dr. Kee taught in the department of religious thought at the University of Pennsylvania.

In addition to membership in such professional societies as the Society of Biblical Literature and the National Councils on Religion in Higher Education, Dr. Kee has for several years been active in the Student Christian Movement.

He is currently chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Movement in the Middle Atlantic Region and chairman of the Study Committee of the United Student Christian Council.

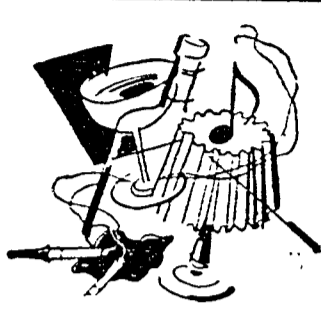
Society Elects Prof President

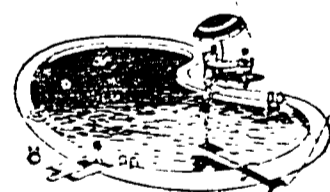

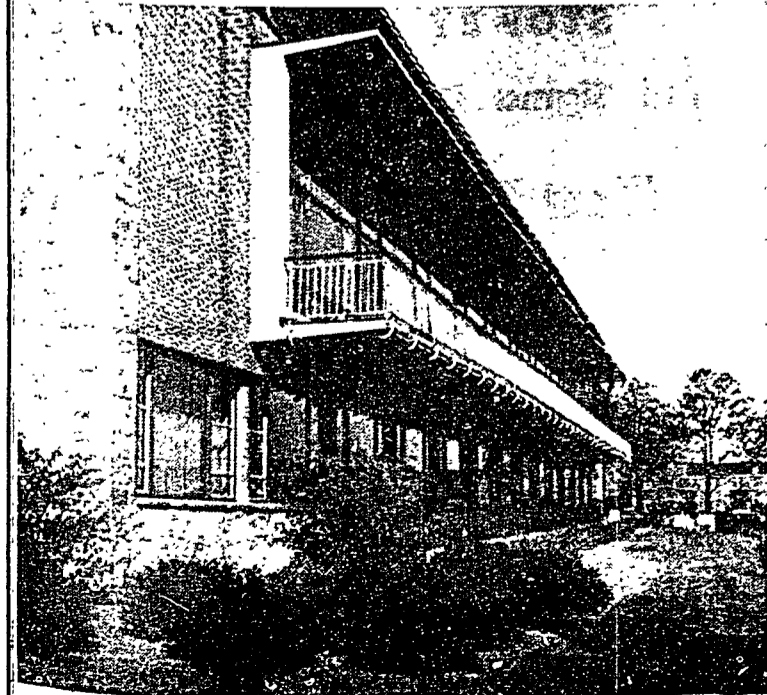
