Deadline Set For Release From Contracts

Men students who have already been assigned to rooms for the fall semester by the Department of Housing may be released from their contracts by applying to the Dean of Men's office on or before June 9.

The announcement was made last night by assistant dean of men Edward O. Pollock at the Interfraternity Council meeting.

The plan will be of benefit to men of second semester standing or higher who believe they can better their University standing by joining a fraternity or by living off campus in approved housing. Apartments are not considered approved housing.

In order to be released from their contracts the students must all ready be pledged by a fraternity or have their off-campus living arrangement approved by the dean of men. The student must also forfeit his ten dollar room deposit.

The plan does not apply to freshmen entering the University in the fall.

Fraternities interested in summer housing for their members should apply for housing in the Fraternity Affairs office in the H. Union Building.

Use of Suites During Rushing Is Clarified

Otto E. Mueller, director of housing, clarified regulations concerning the use of sorority suites during rushing periods at a meeting of sorority representatives and advisers last night.

Mueller stated that the dormitories are designated as public buildings, and as such they come under certain state regulations. He also said that the suites are not designed for some sorority rushing activities.

He suggested the use of other dormitory rooms, as recreation or study rooms and lounges, for rushing activities.

Mueller stressed fireproofing regulations. All decorating material must be fireproof, and combustible items such as straw, leaves, and sawdust, must be treated with fireproofing material, he said.

Also emphasized were rules concerning the removal of furniture from sorority suites. The following rule was mentioned:

The use of sorority lounges as party rooms which requires the removal of furniture or furnishings will be authorized only when other space in the hall is not available for such occasions. Any removal of furniture or furnishings must be accomplished by service employees of the Housing Department. Party chairmen are to make arrangements with the housekeeper of their building for such services.

However, the rearranging of furniture in the suite is allowed, Mueller said, and it may be done by sorority members or with the help of housing department employees.

He also stated that lighted candles are permitted if they are used with care.

Barbara Nichols, president of Panhellenic Council, announced that the council will meet at 7 p.m. next Tuesday in 203 Hetzel Union Building to vote on the admittance or rejection of Sigma Kappa as a new campus sorority. Approximately 65 persons attended the meeting.

Novel by Prof Now on Sale

"The Battle Done," a paperback novel by Samuel L. Rubenstein, instructor in English composition, is now on sale.

The novel is a story of a German prisoner-of-war camp in South Carolina during World War II.

Rubenstein, after attending a school of journalism and advertising in Philadelphia, joined the Army in 1943. After his discharge, he received his bachelor of letters degree in journalism at Rutgers University. In 1951 he earned a master of fine arts degree in creative writing at the State University of Iowa.

Rubenstein has had short stories and translations in Accent, The Western Review, and the anthology New Directions 14.
