Algerian Students Bombard Ministers

ALGIERS, Algeria, May 8 (AP)—Ten thousand students and war veterans protesting France's failure to put down the 18-month-old Algerian rebellion bombarded French ministers with tomatoes and stones at a V-E Day ceremony today.

Targets of the rioters were Robert Lacoste, French resident minister in Algeria; Michael Campeix, secretary of state for Algeria; Marcel Jacques Chevallier, mayor of Algiers.

Ike Asks Patient Disarmament Effort

WASHINGTON, May 8 (AP)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower told his disarmament chief today not to give up the search for some way in which the East and West can cut down their weapons.

"The President directed that we continue to patiently and persistently seek a sound agreement on this matter with the Soviet Union and the other nations," Harold E. Stassen reported after a White House visit.

Stassen called on the President to give him a personal account of the London disarmament conference, a seven-week session which broke up last Friday in disagreement over Eisenhower's "open skies" inspection plan.

Employment Hits New Record for April

WASHINGTON, May 8 (AP)—Nearly 64 million Americans held jobs last month—an April record—while unemployment dropped by 270,000. These figures were reported today by the Labor and Commerce Departments.

Total civilian employment increased by 912,000 from March to April, to hit a new April high of 63,990,000.

Sharett Concerned Over Outbreak

JERUSALEM, May 8 (AP)—Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett expressed concern in a message to UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold today at what Sharett called "the renewed outbreak of violence along the Egyptian and Jordan borders."

House Votes Teacher Bonus

HARRISBURG, May 8 (AP)—The House tonight voted 190-1 to give Pennsylvania's 60,000 teachers an immediate \$100 cost-of-living bonus.

In addition, teachers will receive an extra \$200 a year salary increase for the 1956-57 school year starting July 1 and an identical boost in 1957-58 school year.

The cost of the program will be nearly 20 million dollars in the current two-year fiscal period. If it finally becomes law, it will mean the 1957 Legislature which will have to raise 146 million dollars in new taxes for public schools alone.

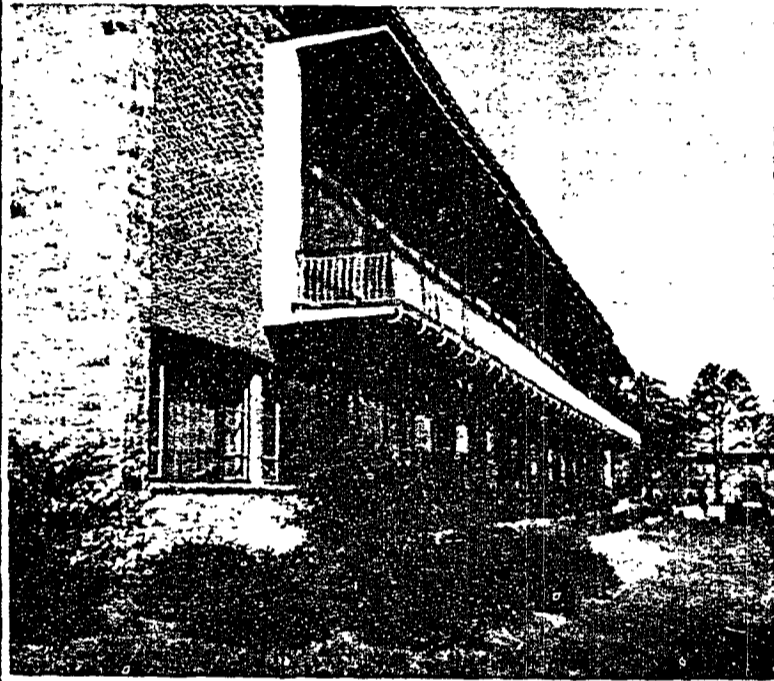
