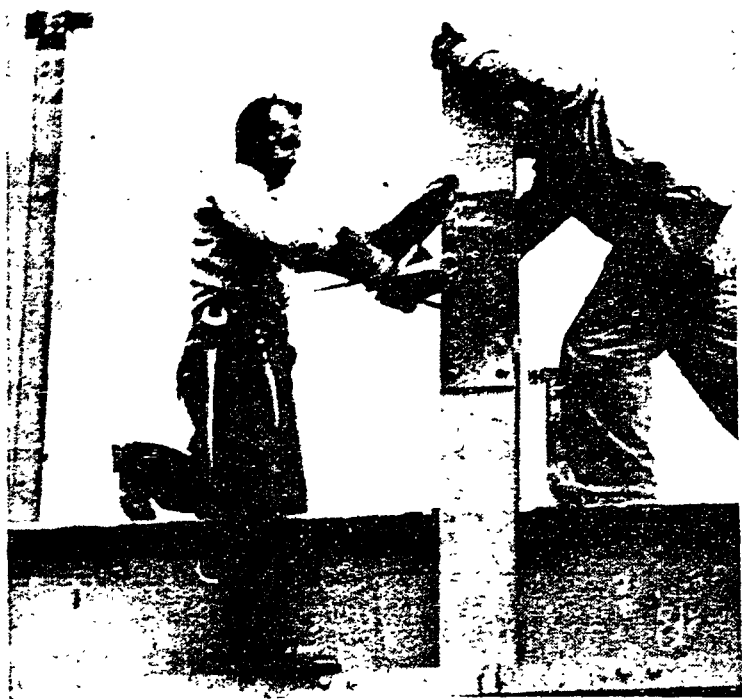

Strike Halts Construction

An electricians' strike has halted work on the interior of two new University hospital wings.

Workmen at the hospital said yesterday the strike, between the General State Authority and an electrical union, has prevented the construction of millwork and the installation of tile and fixtures.

With the stoppage of interior work, workmen have started laying foundations for exterior concrete work, and will start pouring concrete curbs and pavements as soon as the foundations are laid.

Elsewhere on campus, a late shipment of steel has delayed the pouring of concrete floors on the Hall of Americas, a classroom building under construction.

Forms to Be Poured
Despite the delay, workmen should start pouring the concrete forms within two weeks, Earl W. Rife, construction supervisor, said yesterday.

As soon as workmen can start pouring concrete, Rife said, brick work will also be started on the building. At present, men are decking the bottom floor in preparation for laying concrete on the basement floor.

Work on the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Meditation Chapel in Hort Woods is nearing completion. Floors, masonry, and woodwork have been installed in addition to lights and other fixtures.

Inside Gets Final Painting
Workmen are presently finishing a brick patio on the side of the building, and are laying foundations for pavements and walks. In addition, the inside is being given a final coat of paint.

Work on the Waring Hall housing office is also nearing completion. Workmen said yesterday the office and walls are being given a final coat of paint. Desks and cabinets have been installed.

WSGA Passes Motion to Revise Elections Code

Woman's Student Government Association Wednesday night passed the first motion approving revisions of the elections code. Two votings are needed to pass the motion.

An amendment added to the constitution says that WSGA election dates will be announced at the first senate meeting of the semester of the election.

Any other organizations who wish to hold their elections on the same dates must apply their own ballots ballot boxes and poll sitters. WSGA poll sitters are not eligible to poll sit for any other organization.

Must Contact Chairman
These organizations must contact WSGA elections chairman at least one week before the primary election to get permission to hold their elections on the same date.

In the event organizations cannot get their own poll sitters their poll will be closed.

Senate and Judicial members shall be excused from all classes to sit at polls on elections day. In the event that dean's excuses are not granted, members of the House of Representatives and the Freshman council shall be responsible for the polls and poll sitters in their own living units.

Primary Dates Given
It was also recommended that primary elections must be held not less than two days nor more than ten days after the applications have been closed. The primary elections must be held not later than the last weekend in March and that the day be announced at the first senate meeting of the semester of the election.

It was also recommended that the elections chairman be appointed before the end of the semester previous to the coming election.

Christian Leaders To Visit Campus

Thirty Christian leaders from 16 countries of the world will visit the University on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday.

Coming from Asia, Africa, and Latin America, these men and women, who carry important responsibilities in the Christian churches of their home countries, will be welcomed by Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president of the University.

According to the Reverend Hal Leiper, associate director of the University Christian Association, "this Ecumenical (meaning the whole church in the whole world) Fellowship Mission has been gathered by the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions for a tour of the United States for the purpose of sharing with American Christians an understanding of the task of the whole church in this new revolutionary age."

Outstanding Leaders
Among the outstanding leaders in this team of visitors will be Dr. Kyong Chik Han, president of the National Christian Council of Korea, president of the Union Christian College in Seoul, and moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Korea. Another leader, Dr. Andrew Thakur Das, is secretary of the National Christian Council of West Punjab and pastor of the Naulakha Church in Lahore, Pakistan.

The Reverend Takeshi Muto is moderator of the United Church of Christ in Japan. Josefa M. Ilano, M.D., is vice president of the Board of Trustees of Silliman University at Dumaguete, and a member of the medical committee of the Philippine Federation of Christian Churches. Others hold positions of corresponding importance in their countries.

Divide Into Groups
On Monday, after touring the campus and visiting the Atomic Reactor, the visitors will divide into four groups. One of these groups will confer with the members of the faculty of the College of Agriculture. Another will meet with an ecumenical student group from many churches gathered by the University Christian Association.

A third group will be entertained by church members of the State College area in the Westminster Hall of the Presbyterian Church and a fourth group will meet with church members of the Pleasant Gap area in the Lutheran Church.

Eisenhower to Entertain
On May 18, the group will be entertained by Pres. Dwight D. Eisenhower in the White House after conferences through the day in the State Department at Washington. On May 24, the group will complete their tour by attending the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia.

Their tour through State College and appointments here to develop an acquaintance with extension work in agriculture and general education, as well as with the farm families in whose homes they shall be entertained on Tuesday night, has been coordinated by the Reverend John Duley, director of the Westminster Foundation.
