Dr. Dickerson will be working under the auspices of Cornell University which holds an International Cooperation Administration contract for developing the work in research, resident teaching, and extension at the College of Agriculture of the University of the Philippines.

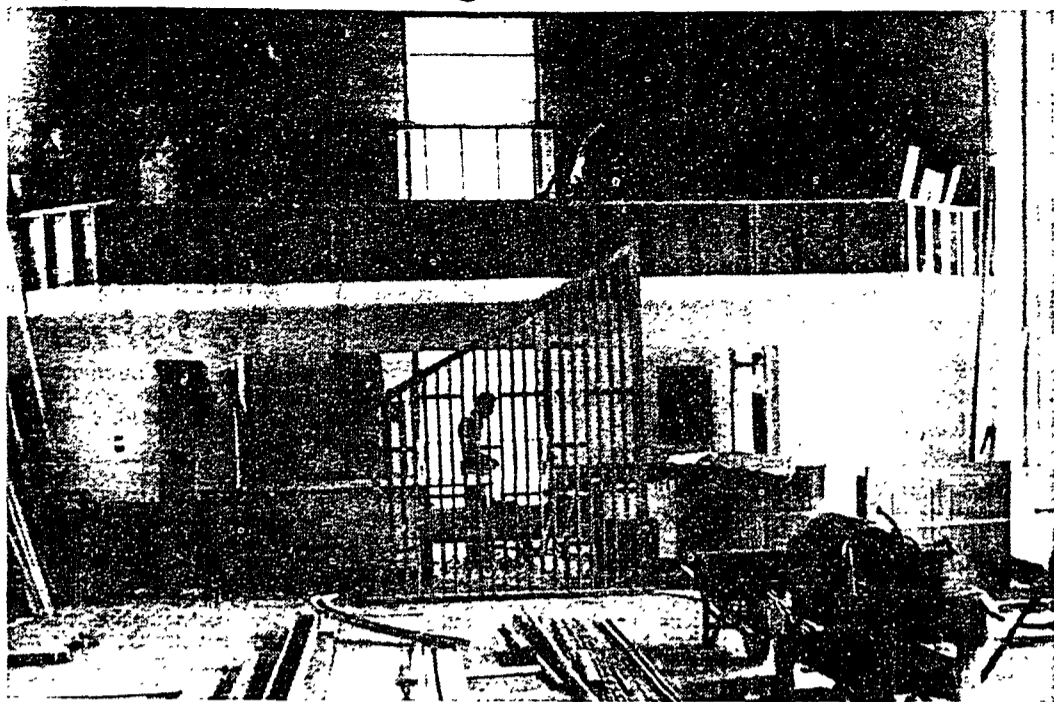
named acting associate dean and director of resident instruction by the Trustees.

Dr. Fred C. Snyder, a vocational agriculture teacher in the Mifflinburg public schools and a part-time instructor in agricultural education at the University, has been named acting assistant director of resident instruction and director of short courses in agriculture.

Involves Educational Planning
Dr. Dickerson's job at the University of the Philippines will involve many phases of educational planning and will include the establishing of a modern curricula, the improvement of teaching methods, the development of library facilities, the acquisition and use of teaching equipment, and the laying out of an overall program of research and teacher training. Since its inception four years ago when four faculty members went to the Islands from Cornell, the project has grown until now there are from twelve to fourteen professors there with their families. Most of the professors are from Cornell, but a few from other universities are employed to assist.

Dr. Dickerson was requested to undertake this assignment because of his broad background in agricultural education and administration.

NSA Group, APhiO to Conduct Textbook Drive Tomorrow

The National Student Association committee and Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity, will conduct a drive for outdated textbooks tomorrow in conjunction with a nationwide NSA project.

The campus NSA group received a request for books to be sent to foreign students in Africa, India, and Asia, from the national headquarters. The books will be sent to students in these countries who could not otherwise afford them.

Alpha Phi Omega members will collect books from fraternities beginning at 7 p.m. tomorrow in the University-owned station wagons. All fraternities have been requested to have books in the entrance halls by 6:30 p.m.

One person in each fraternity, a member of NSA, Alpha Phi Omega, or a hat society, will be responsible for collecting the books in his house.

To Collect in Dorms

Gamma Sigma Sigma, national service sorority, and Panhellenic Council, will organize the collection of books in the women's dormitories. Women have been asked to place books in the cartons that will be provided for them in the main lounge of their residence hall.

Places also will be maintained for the collection of outdated textbooks at the Waring Hall Student Union desk and at the Nittany Post Office for men in Nittany

and Pollock dormitories.

After they have been collected, the books will be brought to the card room of the Hetzel Union Building where they will be packaged and prepared for shipment.

Alpha Phi Omega members assisting in the drive will meet at 6:30 p.m. tomorrow in the HUB cardroom.

NSA Officers Meet

Delegates to Be Selected

The University's delegation to the National Congress will be selected this week, James Musser, campus coordinator, said. The Congress will be held August 21 to 31 at the University of Chicago.

The University is allowed to sponsor seven delegates. However, other groups such as Student Councils and student government organizations must have expressed interest in each sending a delegate, Musser said.

All-University Cabinet last Thursday passed a motion that will allow the NSA committee to select all delegates, whether sponsored by individual groups or as part of the University's allotted delegation.
