

# Lions Split Twin-Bill With Pitt

## Drapcho Sets New Mark, Strikes Out 19 Panthers

It's getting monotonous to say, but Ed Drapcho won another ball game Saturday!

The Lions' ace hurler turned in a masterful three-hit performance in the first game of the twin-bill and established a new Penn State strikeout record when he fanned 19 Pittsburgh batters en route to his seventh victory of the season.

The Lions split the doubleheader, winning the opener, 4-2, and losing the nightcap, 3-2, giving them a 15-3 record.

Stan Szymanski, after pitching four innings of no-hit, no-run ball in the nightcap, weakened in the fifth and was tagged for three runs on three hits, which gave the Panthers enough to win.

Drapcho's new record shatters the "old" record of 16 set by teammate Stan Larimer against Bucknell, May 8. The two runs garnered off Drapcho were unearned and dropped his earned-run average to a minute .91.

Hits and runs were scarce in both games with the Lions getting only 10—six in the first and four in the second—and Pitt getting seven.

The Lions clinched the opener in the first inning when three runs crossed home plate.

Lou Schneider reached first on an error to open the game. Guy Tirabassi backed him up with a single and Bob McMullen followed suit with a sharp hit to right, driving in Schneider. Don Stickler and Jim Lockerman went out in order, but Steve Baidy reached first on Pitt's second infield error, which also sent Tirabassi and McMullen in with the second and third runs.

Both of Pittsburgh's runs were scored on errors. They were scored in the second and sixth innings.

Pitt's pitcher, Pete Lindstrom, fanned seven men but walked six in his eight inning stint.

The nightcap was a heartbreaker for Szymanski, who went down to his first loss. In the fatal fifth Bernie Fedok, rightfielder, opened with the first hit off the Lion southpaw. Apparently shaken by the hit, Szymanski gave up back-to-back hits to the next two hitters, which scored Fedok with the first run.

Szymanski fanned the next hitter and got pitcher Bill Gilmore on a fielder's choice, but, on the play, threw the ball away sending

in the second Pitt run. Schneider, at second, made an error on the same play giving Pitt its third run and consequently the game.

The Lions scored one run in the third on a walk, sacrifice, and back-to-back hits by Szymanski and Schneider. Their final tally came across in the next inning when Bob McMullen walked, went to third on Lockerman's hit, and then stole home.

# Lion Golfers Cop 7th, Whitewash Lehigh, 9-0

Coach Bob Rutherford's Nittany Lion golf squad copped its seventh victory in eight starts Saturday, taming the Lehigh University team, 9-0, before the largest gallery of the year on the University links.

The Lions, in winning, stretched a home-course win streak to 11 games. The Lions have not been beaten at home during the past three years.

Continuing his fine late-season drive that began just prior to the Eastern championships, Gus Gerhart led the Lion attack. Gerhart turned in a 4 and 2 win over Lehigh ace Dave Bates, and scored a one under par 68 to qualify as the day's medalist. His effort represents the best dual meet medal score of the year.

Plays Par Golf Gerhart played par-golf the entire round, deviating only on the 18th where his birdie three enabled him to crack par.

Lion captain Jim Mayes, playing number one, put the Lions off to a good start by rubbing out Lehigh's Mario Posillico, 4 and 3. Mayes' medal score was a 36-38-74.

Rielly Continues Fine Play Sophomore Pat Rielly continued his fine match play by outpointing the Engineers' Fred Babb, 4 and 2. Rielly took the lead early, finally ending the match on the 16th hole. He shot a first round 36, but slumped somewhat to a three-over par 38 in the stretch for his 74 medal score.

Following Rielly, Junior John Branish continued his win streak by beating Charles Austin 4 and 3. Saturday's win puts the Philipsburg junior's dual meet win streak at 15 games.

Branish parred the front nine but tailed off to a 38 on the back nine. His medal 72 tied for the second best Lion effort of the afternoon, however.

Cop Best Ball Point Rielly and Branish brought the Nittanians the best ball point, 5 and 4.

Playing number five, little Johnny Felus made an impressive varsity debut by carding an easy 5 and 4 victory over the Engineers' Dan Lepper. Felus also posted a 72 medal score.

Another Lion reserve, Lou Riggs won his second start in as many assignments to seal the shutout for the Lions. Riggs won 4 and 3 over Les Norbury. He also scored a fine 73 medal score and combined with Felus to give the Lions the best-ball point.

# Yanks Win on Mantle's Blast

KANSAS CITY, May 21 (AP)—The Kansas City Athletics won the home run derby but lost the ball game 8-5 to the New York Yankees today on Mickey Mantle's tremendous homer over two fences, up a 40-foot embankment and out of the park.

The A's hit four home runs, two of them by Harry Simpson, and all with the bases empty. Hector Lopez and Gus Zernial hit doubleheader circuit smashes to lead off the third inning. Simpson hit homers to lead off the second and eighth innings.

Mantle's gargantuan clout came in the fifth, also with the bases empty, and after the A's had handed the Yanks five runs in the first inning, four of them unearned.

The game was further enlivened by a near free-for-all when Billy Martin charged off the bench to do fistic battle with relief pitcher Tom Lasorda in the ninth. Players from both clubs swarmed onto the infield and together with the umpire prevented Martin and Hank Bauer from reaching the mound.

NEW YORK, May 21 (AP)—Wilmer "Vinegar Bend" Mizell, going the rout for the first time this season, pitched the St. Louis Cardinals into second place today as

the Redbirds defeated the New York Giants 4-1 to salvage the last of the three-game series.

Home runs by Rip Repulski and Bill Sarni and a triple by Bobby Del Greco were the most damaging of the eight safeties collected by the Cardinals off four Giant hurlers.

Repulski's home run, his sixth of the year, came in the second inning off starter and loser Don Liddle, and gave the Cards a lead they never relinquished. Sarni's homer, his third of the campaign, came in the fifth, climaxing a three-run assault that sent Liddle to the showers.

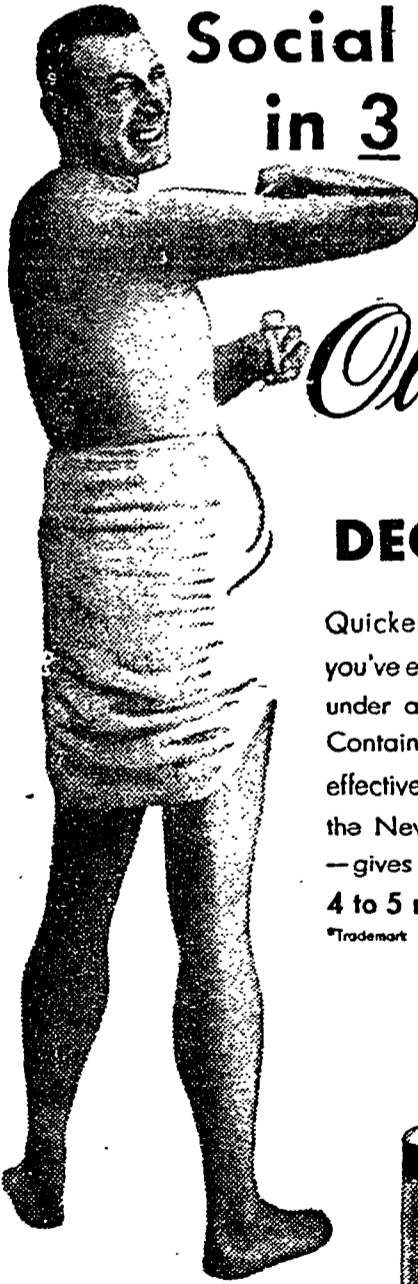
