

# State College Borough Council Authorizes Highway Resolution

Amidst a flurry of mixed reactions over the proposed "Keystone Shortway," State College borough council authorized a resolution favoring the proposal.

The limited access highway, if constructed, would run straight across the state from Sharon to Stroudsburg.

The council hesitated when asked to make a decision Monday night, but authorized the street committee to draft the resolution because, as one member said, "I don't see how

it could hurt us, and we certainly need additional overland facilities."

### May Be Part of Federal System

Two weeks ago, Secretary of Highways Joseph Lawler made public his recommendation to make the proposed highway a part of the federal highway system under a new law approved by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. Acceptance of the route as part of the federal system would mean 90 per cent of its cost would be borne by the government, and 10 per cent by the state.

The road thus would be free, instead of a toll turnpike.

Lawler's statement brought immediate reaction—pro and con—from state and governmental officials. A U.S. representative from the state said construction at certain places could bankrupt the present turnpike system. The same representative called the shortway proposal a "particularly disquieting example of boondoggling by the Democratic administration in Harrisburg."

### To Be Built in Five Years

Shortway Association chairman Z. H. Confair answered the charges on the financial setup by saying it would be three to five years before the road is built.

"By that time, the Turnpike with additional feeder roads from throughout the nation, will have plenty of traffic and won't be hurt at all by the shortway," he said.

In addition, Confair said legislation authorizing construction of the road by the Turnpike Commission was supported by the state legislature last year by both Democrats and Republicans.
