

Cultural Program May Increase Fees

Fifth of a Series

A long range cultural program, such as bringing to the University national art exhibitions or symphony orchestras, and possibly increasing student fees to facilitate the program was recommended at student encampment.

The addition of batten-board construction to improve the acoustics in Recreation Hall was also suggested. The workshop "Social, Cultural and Recreational" reported that a reliable engineer has estimated the cost to be about \$10,000.

This would improve conditions for special events and undoubtedly induce more of them, they said. Schwab Auditorium should also be renovated for concert and lecture programs.

When art is exhibited in the Hetzel Union building, student or faculty guides should either assist the visitors or display written explanations and descriptions of the works, the student-faculty members of the workshop said.

Forum Suggested

The group also recommended that a forum be conducted to discuss the relationship between architecture and religion in the light of the needs of the University students and spirit and renewal to which vital religion must attach itself.

Concerning resources of the University library, it was recommended that open shelf space be increased when students become aware of their responsibility.

They also suggested that departmental libraries be increased with duplications and the visual aids library add more viewing rooms.

Discuss Foreign Students

Included in the workshop discussion was the relationship between foreign students and the University. Social groups and living units, they said, should take advantage of the foreign student directory published by the Office of Foreign Student Affairs, so the students from other nations can profit from their stay.

The group also recommended that living units where a particular foreign language would be spoken—such as a German House, or a French House—be given effective consideration.

The workshop concluded with the suggestion that at future encampments a member of the Board of Trustees be present at each workshop, so that action may be discussed more realistically.
