Food in Dormitories
Mueller said that any student may bring food of any kind into the dormitories on his own if he does not sell it.

Enforcement of the regulation, according to Mueller, will be done by University employes who have been instructed to inform vendors of the policy and report offenders to the dean of men or women's offices, department of housing, or food service.

Encourage Snack Service
"Although it is impossible to satisfy everyone's palate, we are trying to encourage wider use of the snack service operated by the University's food service, and less from outside sources," Mueller commented in explaining reasons for the ruling.

He concluded that a study is currently underway for the expansion of University facilities in order to provide students with the kind of food service they desire.

Meteorology Department To Hold Student Picnic

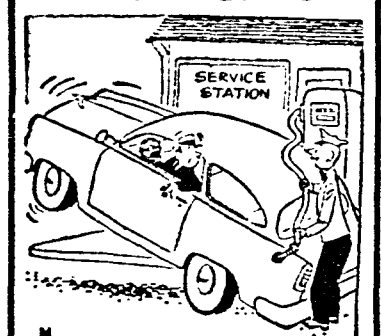
A picnic for students of the meteorology department will be held at 4 p.m. today at the 28th Division Shrine in Boalsburg.
