

Christ-Janer to Explain Role of Student Leaders

Dr. Albert Christ-Janer, director of the School of the Arts, will explain the role of a student leader at the first meeting of the eight week Leadership Training Program tonight.

The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. and subsequent meetings at 7 p.m. All will be conducted in 119 Osmond.

The Leadership Training Program, designed this year for freshmen, includes instruction in parliamentary procedure, committee organization, public relations, and activities planning.

Certificates Awarded

At the end of the eight weeks, students completing the program will receive certificates, a printed summary of the course, and a booklet published by the National Student Association, "A Guide to Parliamentary Procedure."

Students will not receive academic credits. A certificate will not be given if there are more than two absences, and all students must have written excuses for any absence.

The second meeting will be devoted to activities and the structure of student government, administration, and definition and explanation of All-University Cabinet committees.

Publicity Explained

"The Red Tape Special," or how to work with publicity, obtain requisitions, schedule meeting rooms, etc., will be discussed at the third meeting by a panel including George L. Donovan, director of Associated Student Activities, Wilmer E. Kenworthy, director of student affairs, and three students.

Dr. Emory Brown, associate professor of rural sociology, will explain how to conduct committees and demonstrate, with mock committee meetings, how "not to do it" at the fourth meeting.

Joseph F. O'Brien, professor of public speaking, will discuss parliamentary procedure during the fifth and sixth meetings.

At the final meeting, further information on activities will be given. Students enrolled in the program may request specific topics to be considered.

AIM Board To Vote On High Court

The Association of Independent Men Board of Governors will vote on the question of retention of the Supreme Court at 7 tonight in 203 Hetzel Union.

Lash Howes, AIM president, said he expected a split in opinion by the board on the question.

Howes said that he favored abolishing the Supreme Court but that he may decide not to enter into the discussion.

To Air NSA Idea

The board will also vote on the question, originally suggested by National Student Association, that All-University Cabinet appropriate \$750 Scholarship for a foreign student.

Nominations for AIM secretary will be reopened. Elections will follow. John Rhodes, junior in arts and letters from Falls Church, Va., was nominated at the last meeting of AIM.

The position was vacated last spring when James Faust resigned as AIM secretary.

An amendment to the AIM constitution, concerning amendments to the constitution, will be presented.

Amendment Explained

The constitution now requires two-thirds approval of West Halls, Nittany Pollock, and Town Independent Men Councils and majority approval of the board of governors to pass an amendment.

Under the proposed change, an amendment could be approved by a two-thirds vote of the board at two consecutive meetings with no action necessary by the AIM councils.

Harvard Prof to Give Lecture on Astronomy

Dr. Harlow Shapley, professor of astronomy at Harvard University, will speak at 8 p.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium on "Galaxies and What They Do to Us."

Dr. Shapley's speech will be the second in the Graduate School Lecture Series. It is open to the public.

Nelson Sparks Faculty

Dr. G. Kenneth Nelson, associate professor of accounting, sparked in the outfield for the faculty, while Edmund Kramer, president of the council, starred in the outfield for the students. Dean MacKenzie showed his versatility by getting several hits.

A tense moment in the game occurred when the council had the bases loaded and only one out. However, the faculty came through and the next two batters struck out.

If the faculty can keep hitting, like they did this afternoon, the game will probably become an annual affair, MacKenzie said.

Tests Exempt 375 From Composition

Approximately 375 freshmen and transfer students have been exempted from the basic course in English composition on the basis of tests given to the new students at the beginning of the semester or during the summer.

Theodore J. Gates, professor and head of the department of English composition, pointed out that an exemption for a student reflects credit not only on the student's ability, but also on the high school where he was prepared for college.

8 Council Seats Open to Frosh

Freshmen may place their names in nomination for positions on the Liberal Arts and Education Student Councils.

Six seats are available on the liberal arts council and two on the education council.

Nominees for both councils are to submit wallet size pictures of themselves with their nomination blanks.

Nomination blanks for education council may be obtained at the Hetzel Union desk and in 109 Burrows, and must be returned by Oct. 25.

Nomination blanks for liberal arts council may be obtained in 132 Sparks and must be turned in by noon Saturday.

17 Students Fined By Traffic Court

Traffic court levied a total of \$82 in fines Monday night.

Eleven of the 15 students who appeared before the court were fined a total of \$78. These fines included \$39 for traffic and parking violations; \$30 for not displaying vehicle registration stickers; and \$9 for failure to report to the campus patrol office.

Two students failed to appear before the court. They lost their right to appeal and were automatically fined \$2 each.

The court suspended \$8 in fines.
