

Lion Booters Host Colgate

With a three-fold mission in front of them, Penn State's undefeated but once-tied soccer eleven meets Colgate University this afternoon on the Beaver Field soccer turf. Game time is 2 o'clock (DST). The primary objective of the Nittany booters will be to stretch their four-year unbeaten record to 22. But as secondary goals, the Lions will try to 1) maintain their unscored-upon performance and 2) continue their 14-game victory jinx against the Colgate soccermen.
Coach Ken Hosterman's unit has not been defeated since the latter part of the 1953 season. However, a scoreless tie with West Chester State Teachers College two weeks ago mars an otherwise perfect record.
Last week the Lion soccermen added Syracuse University to their list of conquests with an

overpowering 10-0 win. That, coupled with an opening season 8-0 victory over Bucknell, gives the Penn State booters a 2-0-1 ledger to date.
As can be seen from the aforementioned figures, the local booters have tallied 18 goals thus far in the campaign while holding their opponents scoreless. If this type of defense keeps up through the next eight games, the 1956 team will go down in Penn State soccer history.
In 1945 the Penn State booters, then under the tutelage of Bill Jeffrey, went through seven games without their defense being pierced. The following year the Lions registered three more shutouts before Syracuse broke the spell with a four-goal outburst.
Colgate has never been able to defeat the Nittany soccermen since the series began in 1941. Hosterman does not think the Raiders will accomplish this desire today. The Lion mentor is optimistic about the game but he isn't taking Colgate for granted. "We can't walk onto the field

and expect Colgate to hand us the victory," says Hosterman, "but if we play the kind of game we are capable of Colgate will not be a definite threat."
Hosterman is not planning any changes in the lineup which started against Syracuse. John Lawrence will man the goalie position; Otto Rosenberger and Ralph Brower will be at fullback; Steve Flamporis, Herb Hertner, and Ward Hill will handle the half-back spots; and Jim Hedberg, Mike Stollmeyer, Tommy Nute, Per Torgeson, and Dutch Walz will fill out the forward wall.
Torgeson, who with four goals is tied with Stollmeyer for team leadership, is still nursing a bruised instep to his right foot but he is expected to be in the starting array at game time.
In reserve, Hosterman will be able to call on Walt Krauser, Dave Davis, Dave Haase, Jim Benford, Don Dotigald, Bruce Walsh, Don Meyer, Paul Bauer, Jim Edmonds, and Jim Forsythe. Krauser, however, may get the nod at left halfback in place of Hertner.

2 Independents, SPE, DU Advance in IM's

One of the most common miscues in IM football, throwing the ball away after a first down has been made, showed itself enough to prove costly to three losers in some close action at Beaver Field last night.
The Violators edged Nittany 31, 7-6; Sigma Phi Epsilon topped Tau Kappa Epsilon, 12-6; Nittany 44 "buttoned" to the Dinks, 6-0; and Delta Upsilon eliminated Phi Kappa, 33-0.
The Violators were forced to fight back from a 6-0 halftime deficit to keep alive in the independent bracket. Tailback Lou Chillott and wingback Joe Walt put Nittany 31 in the lead early in the contest as they sparked a 76 yard scoring drive culminated by Chillott's aerial to Ned Taylor. The point after touchdown flew wide.
Turbulent Tony Taormina, the winner's triple-threat halfback, personally sparked the victory drive in the final half. The swift back picked up over 125 yards by air and 50 by land during the period and threw the scoring pass to Dean Stabby in third stanza. Ed Terry split the uprights for the triumphant point.
SPE combined their passing and running attack to dump TKE, 12-6, in another thrill-packed vendetta.
The winner's first tally occurred early in the game, right after a TKE punt. Don Capuano connected with Dick Halton from 24 yards out and Duane Campbell's kick sputtered wide. They came back to score again when Ed Olsen of TKE had his

pass pilfered on the 38 by Capuano. On the ensuing play, Jack Michaels pegged to Capuano who, in turn, hit Jim Moore for the six-pointer.
The Dinks controlled the ball against Nittany 44, and managed to cross the double stripe once to stay in the indie race.
DU's John Pepe, was the spring board in its winning attack. He led the offensive scoring parade with a pair of scores and passed for an additional set.
The first touchdown came on an end run by Pepe. Intending to pass, Pepe floated to his left, found all his receivers covered, turned on the gas and roared 15 yards to pay dirt. Dick Jamieson converted.
Three plays later, Jack Olsen gathered in a Phi Kappa punt and connected with Jack Maher for score two. Not to be outdone, Pepe took off on a 65-yard jaunt as soon as DU took over. Jamieson again converted.
The second half was no different—Pepe to Don Shaw, 26-0. Ogie Norris wrapped up the score on a pass from Pepe. The extra point was good.
