

Harriers Cop 2d; Dump Navy, 25-30

The Penn State cross-country team opened an exciting afternoon in Nittany sports yesterday by capturing its second straight win with a 25-30 victory over Navy on the University golf course.

It was the Lions' three sparkling sophomores—Ed Moran, Clem Schoenebeck, and Fred Kerr—again leading Coach Chick Werner's harriers to victory. All three finished in a tie for first in 26:50.4—just :12.3 off the course' record set last year by Pitt's Arnie Sowell.

All three ran a well-planned race, staying with Navy's top man, senior Walt Meukow, every inch of the way. They turned on the gas just before the final stretch to finish approximately 15 yards ahead of Meukow.

There was no question about beating Meukow once into the home stretch—the only thing remaining was which one of the Nittanians would finish first.

They came across the finish line just as they had run the five mile course—together. Meukow finished in 27:11 for a fourth place.

Navy grabbed the next five places as Dick Winter crossed in 27:20.5, Frank Young in 28:01, Les Palmer in 28:06, and Brad Smith in 28:07.

Al Jones and Ron Lewis added the meet-clinching points by finishing ninth and 10th. Jones had a 28:16 time, Lewis a 28:20.

Jones ran what Werner called the best race of his career as he stayed with the first four throughout the early stages of the race. However, he fell behind midway through the course—but managed to hold his ninth spot without any difficulty.

The meet was a good test of team strength for the Lions. Two of the harrier regulars were among the missing when the gun went off. Captain Don Woodrow was away on a geological field trip while sophomore Bob Thompson was sidelined with an attack of virus pneumonia.

The runners came in for a good bit of praise from Werner. He was greatly pleased with the way that they came through in spite of the odds which confronted them.

Werner also had some praise for the Navy club. He said they ran a very creditable race, especially Meukow who had none of his teammates to help him in his race with Moran, Kerr, and Schoenebeck.

Navy coach Jim Gehrdes, a former Lion hurdling star, took the defeat in stride. He praised the Lion harriers for their fine showing and also said that his team ran a good race.

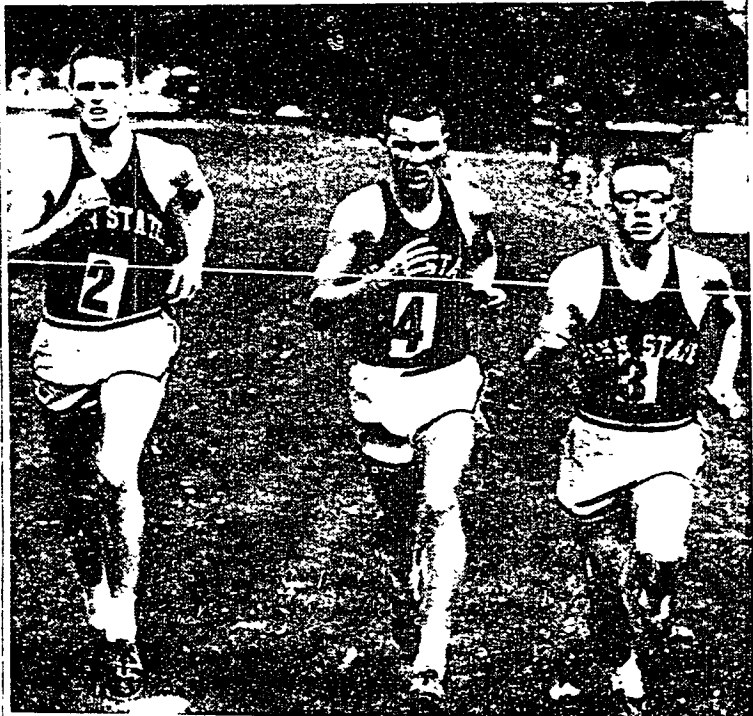
Gehrdes said before the race that the course would not make too much difference in the outcome and confirmed this belief after the meet. He was not disappointed with his team's performance.

The Wernermen will now turn their eyes to powerful Michigan State. They meet the Spartans next Saturday before the football game with West Virginia.

Total game statistics showed the Lions with 207 yards and Ohio State with 188. Plum completed 9 out of 17 passes for 115 yards, while the Buckeyes could only complete three for 89 yards.

The Lion defense lived up to its reputation. Led by the remarkable Sam Valentine and Dan Radakovich, the Lions held the ground-minded Buckeyes in check for most of the game. And when it was needed in the clutch the line held.

Coach Rip Engle used his two-platoon system to the letter. Interchanging at almost every opportunity, the Lions were not worn down as they were in past years.

In the backfield Kane displayed

his pass catching finesse with outstanding pass receiving. Ray Alberigi, Gilmore and Maurice Schleicher all contributed heavily to the Lion victory.

In fact, the whole Lion team was outstanding with sensational defense and offense dominating. Alberigi was the leading ground gainer for the Lions with 46 yards, Kane was second with 41. Clark led the Buckeyes with 87.

The victory today was reminiscent of the one three years ago when the Lions upset heavily favored Illinois 14-12.

At the end of the game many Lion fans swarmed the field and carried Engle and his staff on their shoulders.

Mass chaos resulted and the Lion dressing room was in an uproar. Players and fans crowded the door—and it was almost im-

possible to keep the public out. Over 82,000 fans were dazed when the final whistle blew and many stayed in the stands and just shook their heads.

It was the third win of the year for the Lions against one defeat, that to Army. Since Michigan defeated Army by such an overwhelming score, Ohio State fans figured the game would be of the same nature—and that was their mistake.

A calm group of Lion players ran on the field before kickoff time and when showed the papers of how highly underrated they were, they laughed and walked in the dressing room to put their pads on. When they came out they proved why they had laughed.
