Lozano Backers Threaten Attack

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador, Oct. 22 (AP)—Hundreds of armed partisans of overthrown Honduran President Julio Lozano were reported hiding out in the mountains today and preparing to attack military garrisons.

A three-man military junta, which took over the rule of the country in a bloodless coup yesterday, was heard in a Honduras broadcast to call upon the partisans to surrender their arms. The broadcast promised there would be no persecution of Lozano supporters and urged them not to seek political asylum in foreign embassies.

Hoxsey Case Continues

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 22 (AP)—A Philadelphia pill manufacturer testified today he shipped pills to the Hoxsey Cancer Clinic at Portage, Pa., after other pills had been confiscated at the clinic by the government.

Paul Lustgarten said in U.S. District Court that Dr. Newton C. Allen, clinic director, telephoned him in April, 1955, and asked him to manufacture three types of pills. Lustgarten said he supplied the clinic with half an order.

Red Election Observers Arrive

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—A delegation of Soviet election "observers" arrived today for an on-the-scenes look at American politics and said they hoped to make some "friendly contacts" while in this country.

Talks Raise Hopes For African Union

TUNIS, Tunisia, Oct. 22 (AP)—Morocco's Sultan flew to Tunis today for talks which nationalists hope will pave the way for Algerian independence and formation of a new Union of North Africa.

The union would take in what once was a predominately French domain. France viewed the whole thing with suspicion and suspended talks with the Moroccans on technical and financial aid.

Criminal Intent Needed To Prove Pike Charges

HARRISBURG, Oct. 22 (AP)—A special grand jury was told today that criminal intent must be shown to substantiate charges that there was a conspiracy to defraud the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission of \$19.5 million.

At the same time, acting president Judge William H. Neely of the Dauphin County Court instructed the panel to keep its investigation out of politics.

The first witness will be called tomorrow to inquire into what Gov. Leader has described as "one of the greatest public swindles of all time."

School District Study

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—An extensive study of the proposed reorganization of the state's school districts has been urged before the program is carried out.

The White House Battle—

Eisenhower

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (AP)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower will enter Walter Reed Army Hospital Saturday afternoon for the complete physical examination he said he would undergo before the Nov. 6 election.

The White House announced the results of the "head-to-toe" checkup by an eight-man medical team will be made public not later than next Monday morning.

It was at a news conference Aug. 8 that the President said he planned a re-election test of his health. If it shows him unfit for a second term, he said at that time, he will go before the people and tell them.

James C. Hagerty, the White House press secretary, said Eisenhower's health is "fine" right now.

It developed today that the President may increase his speaking schedule during the last two weeks of the campaign, making several more major appearances outside Washington.

Asked whether Eisenhower might undertake "a major campaign swing into several states or several cities" during the stretch drive, Hagerty replied: "Yes, I think so."

Stevenson

CHICAGO, Oct. 22 (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson said today he shares President Dwight D. Eisenhower's "resentment at the manner and timing" of Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin's H-bomb message.

But, he said, he thought the President's reply "is unfortunate."

Stevenson said the United States should explore Bulganin's proposals "immediately and all the way."

At the same time, the Democratic presidential nominee said this is not the first time Russian leaders have interested themselves in the 1956 election.

He said they have made it plain their candidate is Eisenhower.

Stevenson issued a statement commenting on his opponent's sharp rejection of Bulganin's latest proposal that H-bomb tests be halted by international agreement.

Stevenson has urged the same thing.

He spoke out on the eve of departing for New York on a coast-to-coast tour intended to bring his campaign to what his staff members called a "driving finish."

Pro-Egypt Party Wins In Jordan

AMMAN, Jordan, Oct. 22 (AP)—Jordan's pro-Egyptian National Socialist Party emerged with the largest single block of seats in Sunday's parliamentary elections.

Despite the defeat of party leader Suleiman Nabulsi, the party came through the election with 11 sure seats and the promise that at least three independents will join it after Parliament meets.

There are 40 seats in Jordan's lower house.

Atom Test Blasted

ADELAIDE, Australia (AP)—Britain exploded its fourth and final atomic device early today in its current tests at Maralinga in the south Australian desert. The flash was seen 650 miles away at Port Augusta.
