

University Enters Teams In Livestock Exposition

Two judging teams and 38 head of livestock will represent the University at the 57th annual International Livestock Exposition to be held Friday through Dec. 1 in Chicago.

The University meat judging team, coached by Glenn R. Kean, assistant professor of animal husbandry, will be a strong championship contender in its division. The meat judging competition begins Nov. 26.

Team Places Second

The team this semester placed second both at the American Royal Livestock Exposition in Kansas City, Mo., and the Eastern National Livestock Exposition in Timonium, Md.

Members of the team are Sandra Snowdon, junior in animal husbandry from Allison Park; Thomas Blase, junior in animal husbandry from Glen Campbell; Arthur Tennyson, senior in animal husbandry from State College; and Leslie Firth, junior in agricultural education from Sugar Grove.

The University livestock judging team, which placed fourth in competition at the Timonium exposition, will compete Saturday in Chicago. The team is coached by Herman R. Purdy, instructor of animal husbandry.

The Men's Debate Team unofficially finished eighth in a field of 44 college and university teams participating in the University of Vermont Debate Tournament over the weekend:

The University of Vermont, with a 9 to 1 record, placed first in the tournament, the first of the semester. No awards were presented. Consequently, no official standings were announced, but

unofficial positions were figured from team won-lost scores.

The question was the 1956 national debate topic, Resolved: That the United States should discontinue direct economic foreign aid.

Members of the University's affirmative team were Jay Feldstein, sophomore in arts and letters from Elizabeth, and Robert Neff, junior in zoology and entomology from Pottstown.

The team had one win, three losses, and one tie, defeating Cor-

nell, losing to Bates, Army, and Vermont and tying Holy Cross.

Jonathan Plaut, senior in industrial engineering from Rockville Center, N.Y., and Edward Klevans, senior in electrical engineering from Roaring Springs, debated the negative side.

They had four wins and one loss, defeating Harvard, New Hampshire University, New York University, and Maine University, and losing to Dartmouth College, Dartmouth and the University were undefeated when they met.

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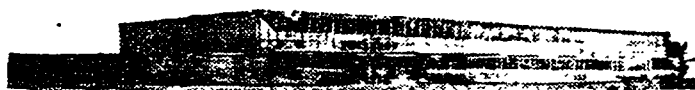
