

'Start Talking Integrity'

Prof Calls for Honor System If Backed by Student Body

A University faculty member suggested last night that an honor system be established if the students desire it.

Major Charles A. Swan, assistant professor of air science said, "If our kids (University students) want an honor system, then we better start talking integrity and give to them." He made the suggestion during a panel discussion at a meeting of the University chapter of the American Association of University Professors.

Swan, chairman of the system now in effect in the Air Force Reserve Officers Training Corps in which senior cadets sign a pledge binding them under a honor code.

Faculty members of the panel Earl B. Swartz, professor of electrical engineering and assistant dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture, explained the honor system used by the University from 1915 to 1918.

He said the system was put away after the one adopted by the Electrical Engineering Department in 1945. The University discontinued the honor system in 1918 because of widespread dishonesty.

Under the program set up in the engineering department, juniors and seniors who voluntarily accepted membership in an honor society organization pledged themselves to promote the honor system, to report dishonesty of classmates, and to participate actively in the organization.

Ken P. Howell Jr., professor of geophysics, spoke on the situation at the University as revealed by an opinion study made last year of students and faculty members.

Howell, in summarizing up the report, made four main points. They are:

1. Only about half of the students who themselves are honest would actively discourage others from dishonesty under the present situation.

2. Nearly two-thirds of those polled said students who cheat do so because of a lack of a strong moral code.

3. There seems to be a difference between the opinions of faculty and of students as to the amount of cheating that goes on. The problem is considered more serious by students than by faculty members.

4. Both the faculty and the student body, by a rate of almost three to one, are sympathetic to the idea of an honor system.

Methods of handling cases of academic dishonesty that are reported were described by Wilmer E. Kenworthy, director of student affairs.
