

Study Compares Grades At University, Centers

A study comparing grades earned by students at the University's centers and their grades made on transferring to the main campus shows that the students do about the same at both places.

W. Stewart Goas of the General Extension Service said he infers from the study that the standards of instruction and grading are apparently constant between the main campus and the centers.

The centers are evidently neither tougher nor easier than the main campus, he said.

The centers involved in the study were those at Altoona, DuBois, Erie, Hazleton, Ogontz, Pottsville, State College, Swarthmore, and Harrisburg. The last three centers have since been eliminated.

The figures, dating up to August 1956, showed that students from the DuBois Center made the highest grades after transferring to the campus. Their grade average at the center was 2.61 and rose to 2.69 at the main campus, giving

them a 2.66 all-university average.

The average for the students from all the centers was 2.44 while at the centers, and 2.48 at the main campus, for an all-university average of 2.46.

The five centers in the study which are still in operation besides the one at DuBois showed these results:

Altoona, 2.39 at center, 2.45 at main campus, 2.42 all-university average; Erie, 2.61 at center, 2.52 at main campus, 2.55 all-university average; Hazleton, 2.47 at center, 2.62 at main campus, 2.56 all-university average; Ogontz, 2.38 at center, 2.40 at main campus, 2.39 all-university average; and Pottsville, 2.50 at center, 2.39 at main campus, 2.44 all-university average.
