

New Technology Courses To Be Given at Centers

The University centers will offer three new associate degree curriculums beginning next year.

The new two-year programs, which were approved Thursday by the University Senate and on Saturday by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, are medical technology, productive technology, and surveying technology.

Pre-Rush Sessions Scheduled

The introductory program to spring sorority rushing will begin tonight with Panhellenic Fireside Chats in the three freshman dormitories.

The chats will be held at 9:15 p.m. in the lounges of Thompson Hall, Women's Building, and McAllister Hall. Freshmen will not be obligated to rush if they attend.

Panel Discussion Planned

Four sorority women will present a panel discussion in each chat. They will discuss the social aspects of sorority life, sorority ideals, and post-graduation advantages of being a sorority member.

After the discussion, freshmen will be able to participate in a question and answer session. Refreshments will be served.

Final hat society counseling sessions on joining sororities will be held tomorrow night. Hat women will discuss "How Can I Join a Sorority" and will answer questions on rushing.

To Meet in Frash Dorms

The counseling sessions will be held at 9:15 p.m. in the regular counseling units of the freshman dormitories.

The program will continue Thursday with open chatter dates in sorority suites. Attendance is not compulsory, nor will women attending be obligated to rush.

The open houses were established last year by the Panhellenic Council to give freshmen a preview of rushing and to acquaint them with rushing procedure.

Trustees Honor Deceased Member

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University Saturday adopted a resolution to put a remembrance of the deceased John N. Forker, a member of the Board since 1943, on the records of the Board.

The resolution cites the Board's grateful recognition of his invaluable service and expresses the sorrow of the trustees, faculty, and staff at his passing.

Mr. Forker died Sept. 18.

The medical technology program, which will become effective Spring semester, offers a combination of science courses that satisfies requirements of the Board of Registry of Medical Technologists.

Degree Awarded

Upon completion of this program the student is awarded the associate degree in medical technology and may apply for entry at any approved hospital. At the end of at least 12 months' work in a hospital training program, the student is qualified to take the examination for certification as a medical technologist.

The surveying technology program is to provide a knowledge of the elements of surveying as applied to construction, land, topographic, geodetic, city, and photogrammetric surveys.

Program Designed

The surveying program is also designed to develop trained personnel who understand the relation between the precision of measurements and the interpretation of data in addition to having an appreciation of the skills and equipment needed to make precise measurements in the field of surveying.

The production technology curriculum prepares its graduates for employment in manufacturing firms in those activities that are associated with production management.

It will accomplish this by studies in basic engineering science, principles of methods analysis, motion study, time study, wage payment, production, planning and control, and quality control. The first year's work will provide a basic knowledge of industrial processes and will enable the student to do simple drafting and perform routine clerical and production functions.

Graduates Qualified

Students completing this course will have a clear understanding of the management controls required to operate manufacturing businesses. They should be qualified for work in computing standards, laying out work-stations, improving methods, writing job descriptions, estimating costs, and making routine calculations.

The programs of surveying technology and production technology will become effective Fall semester next year. Both will include summer session courses.

Ex-Student Sells TV Script

The Kraft Television Theatre will present "Teddy Bear" by James Leo Barrett, a former theatre arts student at the University, at 9 p.m. Wednesday.

The play is the story of Nate, an ex-Marine, who is searching for a man who betrayed his buddy, Ham Burns, in a Korean prison camp. Ham planned to escape and would have succeeded if news had not leaked to the prison officials.

Nate finds the man in a small-

town diner and begins his intricate plot of revenge.

"Teddy Bear" is the second Barrett show to be presented on the Kraft Theatre. The first was "Death of a Sand Flea" which has been purchased by the Jack Webb Independent Film Company and which will be released through Warner Bros. Studios.

"Teddy Bear" will be seen in both black and white and compatible color over Channel 6, Johnstown.
