

# Study Rooms Designated In 8 University Buildings

A schedule of study rooms in eight University buildings for students use was announced yesterday by Roy V. Watkins, scheduling officer.

The schedule is for the current semester.

These rooms, when not being used for regular classes,

will be open for student study during the day, and at least one room in each building will be open in the evening.

### List Posted

A list of the rooms and the hours they are available was posted yesterday on bulletin boards in the eight buildings. A new schedule will be devised for next semester.

The request for study halls was made by several student councils and was recommended two weeks ago at a meeting of the Council of Academic Deans, Watkins said.

# 190 Students Finish Leadership Program

The 8-week Leadership Training Program was completed last week by 190 students—170 freshmen and 20 upperclass students.

Each student will receive a certificate and a handbook of parliamentary procedure, which can be obtained at the Hetzel Union desk following Christmas vacation.

The program was sponsored by All-University Cabinet and directed by a student committee appointed by Cabinet.

### 320 Registered

Robert Stroup, chairman of the program, said that 320 students registered for the program in October.

"If 20 per cent of the 'graduating' students take an active part in campus activities, the program will be worthwhile," Stroup said. "Designing the course primarily for freshmen was a wise recommendation by Student Encampment."

### Fields of Training

The program included training in parliamentary procedure, explanation of the role of a student leader and student government structure, and general information on public relations and committee organization.

Persons who led the discussions were Dr. Albert Christ-Janer, director of the School of the Arts; Robert Bahrenburg, All-University president; Dr. Emory Brown, associate professor of rural sociology; Dr. Harold O'Brien, assistant professor of speech; and Ralph Wherry, head of the department of commerce.

The last meeting was devoted to the discussion of campus political parties, men's and women's hat societies and the Women's Student Government Association. Information concerning these activities was requested by the students participating in the program.
