Six Awards Granted By Chem Group

The Central Pennsylvania section of the American Chemical Society has presented awards to six students, five from the University and one from Juniata College.

Receiving awards were: James B. Anderson, senior in chemical engineering from State College; Charles Bowman, senior in petroleum and natural gas engineering from Pittsburgh; Aner Carlstrom, senior in agricultural and biological chemistry from Akeley.

One Coed Winner
Carol Newborg, chemistry major at Juniata College from Ardmore; Donald M. Ferguson, ninth semester student in petroleum and natural gas engineering from Allison Park; James Ifft, senior in chemistry from Stroudsburg.

The awards are made each year to seniors in chemistry or allied sciences who have attained a scholastic average of 3.5 or better.

Membership Given
The awards include, along with an appropriate certificate, membership in the American Chemical Society and a subscription to one of the scientific publications of the society.

Heading the awards committee this year was Dr. Donald S. Cryder, professor and head of the Department of Chemical Engineering at the University. The presentations were made by Dr. Harold J. Read, professor of metallurgy at the University, and chairman of the Central Pennsylvania section of the society.

UCA to Sponsor Advent Services

A special half-hour Advent pre-Christmas service will be sponsored by the University Christian Association at 8:10 a.m. today in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Meditation Chapel.

A special Noonday Advent service of prayer, also sponsored by UCA, will be held at 12:30 p.m. today in the Chapel.

'Conversation Piece' Offered

A real "conversation piece" is the special course offered by the Department of Speech at the University for foreign students who wish to sharpen their English-speaking abilities.

Conversation is the keynote of the course, which is entitled "American Pronunciation for Foreign Students." It has been given on campus for many years as a service to students and visiting staff members from other countries.

The foreign students, all of whom have some knowledge of English to start with, learn to improve their pronunciation of English words and to master what (to them) must be many of the puzzling aspects of the American idiom.

The class, taught by Dr. Robert S. Brubaker, assistant professor of speech, boasts the largest enrollment in its history this fall—

29 students. Of this total nine are women, the most ever registered.

A breakdown by countries reveals that Japan has the largest representation, 10. Spain and the Spanish-speaking countries of South America, grouped together, have 7 students enrolled. Germany has 3; Syria, 2; and the following nations 1 each: China, Norway, Sweden, Greece, Viet Nam, Italy and Czechoslovakia.

The class meets twice a week as a group under Dr. Brubaker's friendly and understanding guidance. Each student has an additional hour of personal instruction with Miss Rosalie M. White and Mrs. Paciencia Pangilinan, graduate assistants in the speech department. The latter is a native of the Philippine Islands.

Grammar Taught
While the main emphasis of the course is on the correct speaking of English, grammar instruction is introduced when needed. The group class surveys the pitch-rhythm features of the language.

Traffic Court Levies Fines Totalling \$45

Traffic court Monday night levied a total of \$45 in fines against nine students.

The court also ordered a student with seven previous violations to send his car home for a period of 16 weeks.

Parking Violations Total \$23
Parking violations amounted to \$23 while failure to register vehicles accounted for \$15 in fines. Seven dollars in fines was levied for failure to report to the Campus Patrol Office within the next complete school day.

Automatic fines totaling \$53 were given to violators who did not appear before the court. The offenders lost their right to appeal the case.

2 Cases Dismissed
Two cases were dismissed and \$13 in fines were suspended.

Richard Kurtz, senior in business administration from Binghamton, N.Y., who is chairman of the Court, requested students not to park vehicles in any area on the recommendation of department heads. He warned that parking allotments must be approved by the Campus Patrol and that the power to grant parking space has not been extended to department heads.
