

Prize News Photos Shown at Library

Seventy-five prize-winning news and feature photographs by noted American news photographers are on display at the Pattee Library.

These pictures comprise one of the traveling groups of prize-winning photographs from the annual University of Missouri news and feature photography competition.

Loan Blanks Are Available For Women

Application forms for student loans and fellowships are available to University women at the dean of women's office.

The loans, which are financed by Kappa Kappa Gamma Sorority, are available to women under 30 years of age who have completed at least one year of University work. Women in the junior and senior classes will be given preference.

A maximum of \$400 will be loaned to one applicant, and it may be used for tuition, books and supplies, room and board and transportation.

Five hundred dollar fellowships are available to women who will receive a bachelor's degree before July 1. Candidates must have a high scholastic standing, be under the age of 30, and have shown ability in some form of University activity.

The appointments are for one academic year, and are made on a competitive basis without regard to sorority affiliation.

The fireproofing material used was composed of one pound of borax and one pound of ammonium chloride mixed with two gallons of water.

Also displayed are "The Barefoot Contestant," a sports picture by Richard Carlson of the Lawrence, Kansas, Journal-World; and "104 Years Young," a portrait of an aged lady by Earl Seibert, of the Minneapolis Star and Tribune.

Churchill Series Shown

There is also a photograph of President Dwight D. Eisenhower instructing his grandson on how to swing a golf club. It is entitled "Presidential Body English" and was taken by Stanley Trelick of the United Press.

A series of portraits of Winston Churchill in the exhibit is entitled, "A Very Gallant Gentleman Moved Beyond Words." This series is by Larry Burrows of Time magazine.

One feature of the display is the "Dust Bowl Series," a pictorial account of the recent drought in the Southwest, by Dave Mathias of the Denver Post.

About 300 Chosen

The annual University of Missouri competition is entered into by staff and free lance photographers from all over the country. About 200-300 pictures are selected as prize-winners, the pictures are broken into groups of about 80, and these groups are sent around the country for exhibition in various places.

The exhibition at the University is being sponsored by the School of Journalism.

The display will continue until Saturday.

Landscape Division Photographs Roads

The Division of Landscape Construction and Maintenance has completed photographing the University's 81 road and driveway entrances.

The photographs will be sent to the State Department of Highways in Harrisburg.

Walter W. Trainer, director of landscape construction and maintenance, said the photographs and locations of the entrances will be sent to Harrisburg to comply with a State law. The law requires private roads and driveways to be re-registered within succeeding 20-year periods or become public.

(Continued from page five) has been proof-read, it is put in a metal form the size of a page.

Personnel are assigned to "issue" once a week, which means they are expected to be in the office from 4 p.m. until all the proofs have been read and the paper is ready to go to press. Of course, women staffers must leave according to their permissions.

The Collegian goes to press while most students sleep very soundly, three or four hours after Collegian staffers have finished their work. Sometime between 5 and 6 a.m., the big presses begin to roll. They do their job in 15 minutes.

The circulation staff takes over from here. They make sure that Collegians are placed at various points on campus where sleepy students can easily pick them up.

A junior board wire editor has the sole responsibility of choosing stories, writing headlines, and deciding where stories go on the

page. He or she is usually supervised by a senior boarder and aided by a candidate.

The editor of the paper directs day-to-day policy and oversees general operations. Much of his time is spent with public relation work and in preparing the editorial page with the managing editor.

The sports editor directs his two pages as he sees fit.

This year The Daily Collegian is operating in its 52nd year of publication as a student-operated newspaper.

In its infancy the paper was an eight column, four page weekly. Since then, it has grown to an 8- to 12-page tabloid published Tuesday through Saturday.

More than anything, Collegian personnel cherish the words of the late President Ralph Dorn Hetzel:

"No member of the College administration will censor your copy in advance of publication." This policy continues today.
