

Pitt, Orange Next for Cagers

Time always marches on. But for Coach John Egli and his Lion cage quintet, it seems to be sprinting instead of strolling.

With an upset victory over Temple to their credit—giving the Lions their third consecutive victory, good for an 8-3 season record—the cagers now turn their efforts to Saturday night's encounter with Pittsburgh's strong Panthers at Pitt.

To top this, the Lions then return to University Park for a Wednesday night engagement with Syracuse—the third consecutive top-rated astern opponent on their schedule.

Egli, realizing that his team was tired—the Pitt game will be their fourth in a week—scheduled no practice session last night in an effort to rest the players. However, he has a light workout and some "chalk-talk" scheduled for tonight.

He said he planned to talk to the players about their mistakes against Temple, "which," he said, "weren't too many." He also planned to work with center Bob Ramsay on his passes from the pivot post.

Physically, the Lions are in good shape. Ron Rainey's injured ankle has improved greatly, thanks to the outstanding work of trainer Chuck Medlar, and Steve Baidy is apparently over his slight head cold.

Egli will go with his usual five starters against the Panthers. Rainey, the team's high scorer with 171 points, and sophomore Bob Edwards, rapidly becoming one of the best Lion performers with his scoring and defensive play, will start at forward.

Ramsay will be at center with Captain Bob Leisher, whose value can not be realized by the box

scores or record books, and Baidy at guards. Rod Perry, Ted Kubista, Tom Hancock, whose rebounding was a vital factor in the Temple win, Greg Schwendeman and Paul Bauer complete the Lion traveling roster.

Egli said he will use the same type of control game against Pitt that proved so effective against Temple. Although, from the spectator's viewpoint, control ball is not the most pleasing to watch, it has resulted in all Lion wins this season. A team can not run if it does not have the speed, and the Lions lack speed.

Pitt plays a fast-breaking, race-horse type of game similar to Temple's style. Sophomore Don Hennon, a 5-9 wizard, and center Bob Lazor are the big men in the high-scoring Pitt offense.

"Oh, yes!" she said. "What do you wish, Walter?"

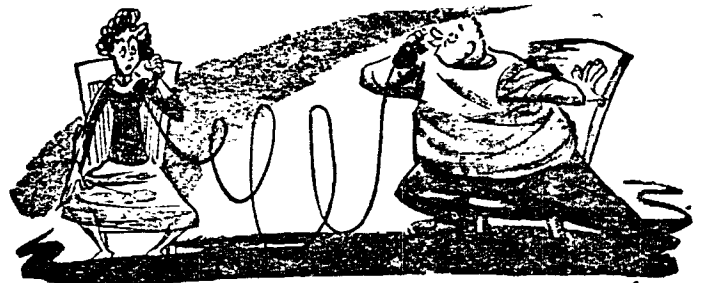
"Werther," said Werther. "What I wish is to take you to the Junior Prom next April."
