

100 Acre Farm Purchased For University Expansion

Present and future construction projects on campus will be made possible with the purchase of 127 acres of land on the western edge of town, President Eric A. Walker said Tuesday.

The University has acquired a 100-acre farm that adjoins the golf course and another 27 acres to the south of Route 45, he said.

Dean Named To Summer School Post

Dr. Palmer C. Weaver, assistant dean of the College of Education and director of Summer Sessions has been named dean of Summer Sessions.

The Board of Trustees also approved the appointment of Dr. Abram W. VanderMeer, professor of education, as assistant to the dean of the College of Education, succeeding Dr. Weaver.

Post Created
Although Dr. Weaver will continue to hold the title of professor of education, the action marks the first time since 1922 that the summer program has not been directed by the dean or assistant dean of the College of Education.

The action also reflects the growing importance of the summer program which last year enrolled 9783 students during the three sessions, marking a new record in summer enrollment. More than 55 per cent of the students enrolled last year were graduate students.

Pitt Grad
Dr. Weaver is a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh and received his M.E. degree from Harvard University and his Ph.D. from Columbia University.

He served as assistant director of Summer Sessions at the University from 1922 until he was named director of the program a year ago.


Appointed in '46

Polio Injections For Students To Continue

Salk polio vaccine shots will be available at the infirmary indefinitely to all undergraduate and graduate students, according to Dr. Herbert R. Glenn, director of the Health Service.

Hospital records show that 475 shots had been given by Feb. 4. The vaccine will be given to any student in good health for the fee of \$1 a shot. Parental permission is required for minors.

The best protection is secured by completing the 3-shot sequence, Glenn said. Anyone having already had one or two of the shots should bring a slip stating this and signed by the doctor who gave the shots.

The University offers this program in connection with several other universities such as Yale, Cornell and Columbia. Permission has been received from both the County Medical Society and the State Medical Society.

After the Christmas vacation the program was established using vaccine from the state. Since then the University has instituted a purchasing program of its own.

The projects include:
1. Possible relocation of Beaver Field to the west, allowing more central campus space for construction of classroom buildings.
2. Possible relocation of the golf course to the west also for building space.

3. Renaming of the Hall of the Americas classroom building, now under construction, to the Boucke Building. This change was dictated by the fact, Dr. Walker explained, that it would have cost the University \$100,000 to carry out the original Hall of the Americas project, money that it does not have and had little prospects of getting.

Dr. O. F. Boucke was from 1923 to 1931 head of the Department of Economics and Sociology.

4. Eight buildings; new engineering building on College Ave.; a petroleum laboratory on campus; an extension to the home economics building, also along College Ave.; a meats laboratory; a swine research center; new turkey breeder and brooder houses; and a military science building east of the flower gardens.

5. Residence Halls: four women's halls now under construction on College Ave., two projected women's halls in the Pollock area and men's halls to be located at Shortlidge Rd. and Park Ave.

New ROTC Building Planned for Future

The Board of Trustees has approved preliminary plans and sketches for a military science building to be constructed east of the University flower gardens on Three Mile Rd.

The building will provide office and classroom facilities for the departments of military science and tactics, naval science and air science, as well as some classroom space that will be used by other departments of the University.

Construction will begin Jan. 1, 1958, and the building is scheduled to be ready for use for the fall semester of 1959. Final plans are to be completed by Aug. 1, and bids are scheduled to receive final approval by Nov. 1.

4 Floors Planned
There will be three floors, in addition to a basement, in the proposed building, with the Air Force, Army and Navy using the first, second and third floors respectively. Some classrooms on each floor will be available for other than ROTC instruction until such time as all are needed by the ROTC departments.

The basement will be shared by the three units for supply and issue of equipment.

A one-story laboratory unit attached to the main building by a covered passageway will be used for the housing of special heavy ordnance equipment.

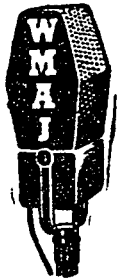
Shooting Range
Also attached to the main building will be a one-floor shooting range. Rifle matches between the University and rifle teams from other schools will be held at the range.

The new building is being designed by Buchart Engineering Corp. of York. It is part of a \$10,625,000 program approved for the University last July by the General State Authority, the borrow-and-build branch of the state government.

The building will bring to-

gether all branches of the Reserve Officers Training Corps program at the University, the largest program in the country.

At the present time, the units are housed in Engineering "E," the Armory, and Carnegie Hall, with storage facilities provided in the basement of McAllister Hall and elsewhere.



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
