

Middie Matmen Seek To Even Series Record

Navy will be out to even its all-time wrestling record with the Lion matmen tomorrow afternoon when the once-beaten Penn State grapplers travel to Annapolis.

In 42 meets between the two schools—a series dating back to 1910—the Middies have emerged with 20 wins, 2 losses, and one tie.

Last year, Navy dropped a 23-7 decision on their home mats. Only three men who saw action in that meet have returned this season.

The Middies show a record of 2-1 thus far in the campaign. They opened the season with a 27-3 rout over Pennsylvania, lost a 16-14 decision to Syracuse, and last week trounced Columbia, 24-5.

Three of the Navy grapplers boast untarnished 3-0 records including the Middie captain Bob Daughenbough and lettermen Joe Langton and Art Wright.

Daughenbough wrestles at 147 and Langton at 137 while Wright can go at either 177 or heavy-weight. Each man owns two decisions and a fall over their opponents.

Last year Langton was decided by the Nittanians' John Pepe 6-1 and Wright was floored by the now departed Bill Oberly.

The other Navy veteran is 137-pound Bob Green. Green is 1-1 for the season, winning against Columbia but losing against Syracuse. Last year Green was pinned by Johnny Johnston.

Two other Middie matmen are 2-1 for the season. Jim Zerberlein, 157, possesses victories over Columbia and Syracuse opponents, and Bob Friedman—who competes at either 167 or 177—owns wins against Penn and Columbia.

At 123 Navy can call on either Bob Lustfield or Ulihorn. Lustfield won at Penn but lost to Syracuse while Ulihorn was pinned by a Columbian.

Sam Unterhill is another aspirant at 130. He copped a forfeit victory against the Quakers.

George Breinerd, 157, Stremic, Hwt., and Baker, 167, could also break into the starting array. Breinerd won a decision from a Penn and Stremic was victorious against Columbia. Baker was beaten in his only start against Syracuse.

Fred Kerr, Don Woodrow, Ron Lewis and Ed Moran will comprise Chick Werner's two-mile relay team in Saturday's Milrose Games at Madison Square Garden.

Junior Jim Norton will make the trip to New York as an alternate.

Sophomore Ed Moran, who registered a 1:55.8 half mile on the Recreation Hall boards last Saturday, will anchor the relay.

Among the Lions' opponents will be Georgetown, Fordham, Manhattan, St. Johns, Syracuse and Yale. Georgetown's Dave Proctor, Norm Williams, John Nelson and Bob Carney captured the two-mile relay in 7:42.3 at the Boston Athletic Association Games last Saturday.

In other carnival events two Olympic Champions from Villanova have a chance to retire two of the most cherished Milrose cups.

Ron Delaney, a 21-year-old Irishman and youngest of the four minute milers, will attempt to duplicate his 1956 victory in the Wanamaker Mile by defeating a six-man field, including Hungarian refugee Lazlo Tabori and U.C.L.A.'s Bobby Seaman.

Charlie Jenkins, Olympic 400-meter champion, will aim for his second Milrose championship in the Mel Sheppard 600. Should Jenkins lose in the 600, Mal Whitfield will receive the cup by mail if this year's winner fails to better his 1:10.8, the fastest time in the Sheppard 600.

Tom Courtney, who tied Whitfield's indoor world's record of 1:09.5 in the 600 last Saturday at Boston, has moved up to the 880 to challenge Pitt's Arnie Sowell.

2 Ties Feature Opening Round In 'B' Bowling

Scoring 4-0 wins were Alpha Sig and Sigma Chi. Bob Johnson and Ray Euler paced the Alpha Sig attack while the high man for Sigma Chi was Dennis Halterman. Dean Frey, Alpha Chi Sig's top man, and Ed Gruss, Phi Kappa, led their team to victories.
