Abel Joins Journ Staff Ag Division

C. Wallace Abel, business manager of the Octoraro Newspapers, Quarryville, has been named assistant professor of journalism at the University.

He will work with the School of Journalism and with the College of Agriculture in developing the University's new program in agricultural journalism.

To Aid Ag Students

This program, which permits a student to complete the equivalent of a major in journalism while meeting the requirements for a degree in agriculture, is intended for students who wish to work on farm magazines, as farm editors of newspapers or in special advertising positions requiring an understanding of both agriculture and journalism.

The demand for persons with this combined training has far exceeded the supply of trained persons available.

To Serve as Adviser

Abel will serve also as adviser to agricultural student publications.

Born in Uniontown, Abel received his bachelor of arts degree from Westminster College and a master of arts in journalism at the University of Missouri. He served as reporter-photographer and then editor and city editor of the Pontiac, Ill., Daily Leader before going to the Lancaster New Era in 1952.

In his present position, which he accepted in 1954, he has been concerned with the publication of the Quarryville Sun and the Christiana Local Ledger and conceived the idea for launching Lancaster Farming, a county-wide farm paper in Lancaster County which has had phenomenal success.

Arts Director Sells Painting

A painting by Albert Christ-Janer, director of the School of the Arts, has been purchased for the permanent collection of the Staten Island Institute of Arts and Sciences.

Entitled "Staten Island Spirits," the work was selected for purchase from among paintings of 20 artists who participated in a "painting bee" on Staten Island last fall.

"Staten Island Spirits" is an expressionist abstraction which indicates the masts of the ships and the industrial machinery on the docks near the St. George Terminal on the Island. Painted in a mixed medium of tempera paint and oil glazes, it creates a harmony of cool colors relieved by brilliant points of red and orange. Among the other artists who participated was Adolf Dehn, who will serve on the Summer Session faculty of the School of the Arts at the University.

'Conformity' Is Topic Of Chapel Speaker

Col. Francis P. Miller, of Charlottesville, Va., will speak on "Conformity" at the chapel service at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

For the service, the Chapel Choir, directed by Mrs. Willa C. Taylor, will sing the anthem "O Praise Ye the Name of the

Lord" by Nikolsky, while George E. Ceiga, organist, will play as the prelude, "Prelude on the Tonus Peregrinus" from Fourth Sonata by Rheinberger. As the postlude, he will play "Fugue" from Seventh Sonata.

Colonel Miller, a native of Kentucky, received his bachelor of arts degree from Washington and Lee University and also holds a bachelor of arts and a master of arts degree from Oxford University. He served in World War I and World War II, and in the latter was on the intelligence staff of SHAEF headquarters.

Colonel Miller has served as secretary of the International Committee of the YMCA and as president of the World's Student Christian Federation in Geneva, Switzerland. He helped to organize the public affairs committee and national policy committee and was organization director for the council on foreign relations.

From 1938 to 1941, Colonel Miller was a member of the Virginia House of Delegates and in 1949 he was a candidate for election to the U.S. Senate.

Colonel Miller is a member of the Commission of Twenty-Five of the World Council of Churches, and a member of the board of the West Point Military Academy and Mary Baldwin College, Staunton, Va.

He is the author of "The Giant of the Western World" and "The Blessings of Liberty."


