The 5 O'Clock Theatre was begun in 1949 as a function of the Experimental Theatre to give theatre arts students a chance to see their scripts in production.

The plays are presented at 5 p.m. Tuesdays in the Little Theatre in the basement of Old Main. The productions usually last only 25 minutes in order to allow students to return to the dormitories in time for dinner.

The scripts are produced either an elaborate production including memorized lines, sets and costumes or in a sketch type production in which the actors read from scripts and costumes and sets are not used.

5 O'Clock Theatre is only one branch of the Experimental Theatre which is a research division to coordinate the work of the different theatre arts groups.

Included in the work of the Experimental Theatre this year was the short course in comedy which was presented last semester.

Other phases include the new play project "One's A Crowd" by Eugene Raskin which will open Feb. 22 at Center Stage and the presentation of the locally adapted version of Mary Webb's "Precious Bane" by Warren Smith, associate professor of theatre arts.

Air Force Officers To Open Workshop

Col. Daniel F. Riva, professor of air science, and 1st Lt. Andrew F. Visnovsky, assistant professor of Air Science, will be guest speakers at the first meeting of the Blue Yonder Workshop sponsored by Angel Flight.

The meetings of the workshop will be held from 7 to 8 p.m. every Wednesday starting Feb. 20 and ending April 10 in 110 Electrical Engineering.

At the first meeting of the workshop, Colonel Riva and Lieutenant Visnovsky will speak on military defense fundamentals of the Air Force, customs and courtesies of the service, and grades and ranks of the service.

First Duty Discussion

The second meeting will be a discussion of what is to be expected at the first duty station. Two officers from Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Tex., who work with newly-assigned officers at the base, will be flown to the University to speak to the group.

For the third meeting the Angels have planned a tea so that the group may informally socialize with guests and discuss subjects of their own particular interest.

The fourth meeting will be a discussion of base living such as job opportunities for wives, the housing situation, schools, special services and activities, security measures and military positions and duties.

Religious Talk

At the fifth meeting the group will continue its talk on base living by discussing religious matters.

Reassignment, orders, packing and shipping household goods, transportation and traveling, and preparing for overseas movement will be discussed at the sixth meeting of the workshop.

At the seventh meeting, the group will hear a talk on the legal and personal affairs, pay and allowances, allotments and insurance, reserve obligations and re-

tirements, records and budget, passes and leaves of absence of servicemen.

Olmsted Field Trip

The final meeting of the workshop will be an all-day field trip to Olmsted Air Force Base near Harrisburg. The program at the base will be planned by the wives of the servicemen stationed at the base.
