# Barbershop Sing to Aid MD Charity

The first annual Barbershop Quartet Contest, originated to aid the muscular dystrophy campaign and promote barbershop singing on campus, is scheduled for April 10 in Schwab Auditorium.

The contest, sponsored by Sigma Phi Alpha fraternity, is open to all student organizations—sororities, fraternities, dormitory units and campus clubs. Engraved trophies will be awarded to both the men's and women's groups that place first.

### Groups to Sing Twice

Each group will sing two barbershop numbers, the total time not to exceed six minutes. Standard barbershop quartet singing and the judging for this contest are based on modern chords, four-part harmony, no extended solos, melody in second tenor except solos and no musical accompaniment.

### Group Judging

The entries will be based on pitch, harmony, blend and stage presence. Costumes may be worn. Women's quartets will be judged independently.

Sigma Phi Alpha is presently sending entry blanks to campus groups. The deadline for returning the blank is March 23. A fee of \$5, to go to the muscular dystrophy fund, will be charged.

# Court Levies \$103 in Fines

A total of \$103 in fines was levied at a traffic court meeting Monday night.

The 12 students who appeared before the court were fined a total of \$37.

Traffic violations accounted for \$20, while failure to register or display registration stickers amounted to \$15. The remaining \$2 was levied for failure to report to the campus patrol within the next complete day.

Four fines totaling \$17 were suspended, and three violators were dismissed.

Automatic fines amounting to \$66 were given to 11 violators. The offenders lost their right to appeal the case, and it was also recommended that one of these students have his car sent home.

All-University Cabinet has loaned \$75 to five of the Hungarian students now attending the University. The students have been provided with free room and board in private homes and fraternity houses.

Seven full tuition scholarships were awarded the Hungarians by the Board of Trustees.

# Landscaping To Begin At Boucke

Landscaping of the Boucke Building, formerly Hall of Americas, will begin as soon as the weather breaks and workmen complete outside construction on the building, according to Walter W. Trainer, director of landscape construction and maintenance.

Most of the work this semester on the new building, said Trainer, will be confined to preparing the ground and planting grass seed. The ground must first be covered with 18 inches of top soil and then graded.

### Hospital Planting Begun

Trainer said that landscaping is about one-fifth completed on the University Hospital. Work yet to be done includes the planting of evergreens on the west and south sides of the buildings and deciduous bushes on the east side.

Most of the planting is being done with bushes and evergreens from the Hort Gardens between Pollock Rd. and the greenhouses. Trainer said that eventually all bushes and plants will be moved out of the Gardens to make room for a proposed parking lot.

### Landscaping Progressing

Landscaping is progressing around the home management buildings on East College Ave. and will be completed by the end of spring.

Hemlock, pine, and dogwood trees are being moved out from the front of the Petroleum Refining Laboratory to make room for the new engineering buildings which are in the planning stage.

# Marine Recruiters To Visit Campus

The Marine officers procurement team will visit the University Monday and Tuesday to interview undergraduates for the platoon leaders class.

The class is open to male college freshmen, sophomores and juniors.

Having completed the program and received his college degree, the graduate will be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps Reserve.

The team will be in the Hetzel Union Building.

# 'Clean Financial Break' To Be Made by FMA

The Board of Trustees of the Fraternity Marketing Association decided Monday night that their dissolution will involve a "clean financial break."

The Board, in doing this, emphasized that the IFC Purchasing Program, to replace FMA, will not merely assume the duties of FMA, but will be an entirely new body.

The President of the Board, Assistant Dean of Men Harold W. Perkins, said the IFC buying plan should not be connected with the present organization, since this would tend to make fraternities hesitant for some of the reasons that have made FMA such a controversial body.

### To Return Deposits

In compliance with this decision, the Executive Committee, when operations of the Association have ceased, will arrange for the return of deposits and surpluses to the member fraternities after all legal and accounting fees have been paid.

Disposition of office equipment owned by the Association will be left in the hands of the Executive Committee.

### New Plan Advantageous

FMA, which consigned itself to its fate after a "100 per cent or nothing" plea failed last semester, sees certain advantages to be had by the IFC Purchasing Program now in its planning stage.

The University's Board of Trustees has offered consultation services of University specialists, recommended that the Senate Committee on Student Affairs issue a charter to the IFC program, and offered the auditing services of Associated Student Activities.

### Manager to Be Hired

Dean Perkins also said that IFC's much larger financial reserves would make it possible for them to hire a manager for the program immediately, something badly needed for such an organization.

The FMA treasurer's report revealed that \$80,641 in business was handled by the association through Jan. 31, resulting in total discounts of about \$3900, minus service charges of about \$1200, leaving a total savings of approximately \$2700 for the 29 member fraternities.

# AIM Governors Meet Tonight

Stanley Rudzinski, chairman of the Association of Independent Men handbook, will present a report of his committee to the AIM Board of Governors at 7 tonight in 203 Hetzel Union.

Lash Howes, AIM president, said that the board will dispense with regular parliamentary procedure for the meeting and discuss matters as a committee-on-the-whole.

Other business to come before the board includes a discussion on the openings for chairmen of the elections committee and social committee. A University coordinator for the National Independent Student Association will be appointed.

The board will also discuss plans for Spring Week, NISA Week and the national convention to be held in Chicago, Ill., and the AIM-Leonides spring dance.
