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tical Institutes." Rousseau was not a revolutionary, Dr. Roudiez said. He would not have existing institutions destroyed, but would rather build up the society of "general will" around these institutions.

Explained Equality Concept
Dr. Roudiez explained Rousseau's concept of equality. Basically, it is that no man must be rich enough to buy another, nor must any man be poor enough to sell himself. This, not absolute equality and collectivism, was Rousseau's concept.

Vessel Design To Be Studied

A study of the design of pressure vessels at both normal and elevated temperatures will be conducted in the Department of Engineering Mechanics.

Listed as a project on "Design of Pressure Vessels Based Upon the Plastic Range," the study is sponsored by the Pressure Vessel Research Committee of the Welding Research Council. It will deal with the development of stress analysis procedures for the design of pressure vessels at both normal and elevated temperatures.

Studies will be the interest in various engineering applications, including reactors and other pressure vessels operating at elevated temperatures.

Dr. Joseph Marin, professor and head of the Department of Engineering Mechanics, will conduct the project with the assistance of M. G. Sharma, research assistant.
