

\$40 Collected For Kadis Fund

The Varsity "S" Club collected approximately \$40 at the University ice skating rink last night in its drive to collect funds for Dick Kadis, hospitalized Geneva College football player.

According to Club spokesman Dick DeLuca, 60 people used the rink last night. University officials last week granted the Club and The Daily Collegian, joint sponsors of the drive, permission to operate the rink for their fund-raising campaign.

The rink will again be open from 7-10 tonight and tomorrow night with all proceeds collected being turned over to the Club and the Collegian. The admission price is at least 50 cents, but larger donations will be accepted.

As an added feature, the Club and the Collegian have obtained the services of Mrs. Marilyn Tammen, 1947 California and United States skating champion. Mrs. Tammen will perform in a four-minute skating exhibition both nights. Approximately 45 people watched her performance last night, DeLuca said.

Although last night was only average, DeLuca said he was hoping for a bigger crowd tonight. He expects the largest crowd of the drive Thursday night since all State high schools are closed Friday in celebration of Washington's Birthday.

Yesterday marked the opening of the drive, but no figures were available as yet on total collections. The Club and the Collegian obtained permission to solicit sororities for funds and private donations are being accepted.

Persons donating to the drive are asked to make checks payable to the Varsity "S" Club or, if they wish to donate cash, to leave it at the Collegian office in care of Sports Editor Fran Fanucci.

The Penn State drive is just one of the many being conducted over the state. However, due to the tremendous hospital bill facing the Kadis family—it now totals over \$13,000—it is doubtful that the total expense will ever be reached.

Kadis' father, who has borrowed approximately \$3000, and Geneva College, which has no insurance covering injured athletes, have made attempts to raise the necessary money. However, neither were able to obtain sufficient funds.

Kadis was injured in a Sept. 29 football game with Waynesburg. Suffering from a cerebral hemorrhage, he has been in a coma for four and one half months. His condition is still listed as "poor" at a Cleveland hospital.

Cornell Matmen Top F&M

Only one of the two opponents left on the Lion mat schedule saw action over the weekend but several other teams who will compete against the Nittany grapplers at the Eastern Tournament, March 15-16, got in their licks.

Cornell prepped for its Friday night encounter with the Penn State matmen by defeating Franklin and Marshall, 19-10.

In other Eastern wrestling results Navy toppled Maryland, 15-9; Army tied Lehigh, 14-14; Brown edged Princeton, 15-11; and Harvard ran over Penn, 27-3.

Cornell copped five matches and registered a draw in its victory over F&M. One-hundred and twenty-three-pound Carmen Molino—whose only loss this year has been to Pitt's Bill Hullings, 3-2—gained the only fall for the Big Red.

Navy used two decisions in the last two bouts of its meet with Maryland to emerge victorious. The biggest surprise of the night was provided in the heavyweight action when Navy's Tony Stremic decided Mike Sandusky, 5-2.

Army rallied in its final bout with Lehigh to surprise the heavily-favored Engineers. Down by a 14-11 count at the end of seven matches, Army's heavyweight Novogratz carved

out a 4-1 win over Bob Davidson for the draw.

Lehigh battles with the Middies this Saturday at Bethlehem. Led by undefeated co-captain Frank Smith, Brown handed Princeton its first Ivy League defeat of the year. Smith, who hails from Bethlehem, ran his unbeaten mark to six with a 8-1 victory over Kurt Dohan.
