

Housing Evaluation Plan Remains Nebulous-Simes

The University's proposal to evaluate downtown housing conditions for students is still very much in the planning stage, Dean of Men Frank J. Simes said yesterday.

Simes could set no tentative date for the beginning of the inspection program. He explained that the problem is very complex, involving inspection of all downtown housing facilities and that it involves considerable preliminary discussion before it can begin.

Stock Drawings For Ag Show Set for Tonight

Fitting and showing demonstrations will be given to help prospective contestants. The dates of the demonstrations have not been announced.

Theatre Art Display To Open Tomorrow

An exhibit showing the "Theatre Through the Arts" will open tomorrow in the art gallery of the Hetzel Union Building.

The exhibit will be displayed in conjunction with the pre-Broadway presentation of "One's a Crowd" by Eugene O'Neill, which begins a six-week-end run at 8 p.m. tomorrow at Center Stage.

Organized by the Department of Theatre Arts, the display will show the many facets of arts involved in the theatre. In producing a play, arts are employed as integrated accents to clarify and to interpret action.

The theatre is unique in that it embraces all the visual and aural arts to the degree that they are helpful in the presentation.

Creates Play Spirit

Although the place of the arts in the theatre is intangible, the use of color, line, form, rhythm, light composition, and harmony are all created by the spirit of the play.

The theatre of today has developed into such a complex means of expression that its component parts have become art forms in itself.

Included in these parts are acting, directing, lighting, make-up, costuming, properties, construction, designing, public relations and dance and music.

Displays to Be Used

All of these facets will be shown with the help of displays, models, masks, sketches, photographs, stage plans, poster, brochures and specially designed properties.

The exhibition will open officially at the private party to be held following the premier performance of "One's a Crowd." The party, which will be attended only by invited guests of the De-

partment of Theatre Arts, will be held in the second floor lounge of the HUB.

Including among the guests will be members of the University administration and officials and theatrical friends of the author and director from New York.
