Company B-5, the University's Pershing Rifles unit, will hold its 25th anniversary dance at 9 tonight in the Armory. A flag-raising ceremony was held at 7 a.m. today in front of Old Main.

In its 25 years at the University, the unit has served as honor guard, ceremonial firing squad and drill demonstration team.

Fashion Show To Be Given By Leonides

A spring fashion show, including fashions for both men and women, will be presented by Leonides at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the Hetzel Union assembly room.

Clothes from a State College women's and men's clothing store will be modeled, and two movie tickets will be awarded to one of the first 200 persons to arrive.

Among the eight male models will be Lash Howes, president of Association of Independent Men; Leonard Richards, All-University secretary-treasurer; and Bruce Gilmore, member of the varsity football and wrestling teams.

The Don Early Quartet will play for the show and Jeannette Bloom, freshman in arts and letters from Reading will commentate.

Admission is free.

Its 1957 program will include a parade at Rutgers University, the All-University drill meet on Mother's Day and the annual regimental drill meet in Pittsburgh.

Company Firsts

Company B-5 was one of the first Pershing Rifles units to include members of the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps. It was also one of the first to include platoons outside its own campus. Platoons from Pottsville and Ogontz center participate in activities of the unit.

Members of Pershing Rifles at the University can be identified by a blue and white cord on their uniforms and a blue and white service ribbon.

Pershing Rifles was established in 1894 at the University of Nebraska by General John J. Pershing as an Army Reserve Officer Training Corps demonstration team. It is now a national professional and honorary fraternity of all ROTC branches.

Retired MI Dean Dies In Pittsburgh Hospital

Dr. Elmer Allen Holbrook, who was from 1922 to 1927 dean of the School of Mines and Metallurgy, now the College of Mineral Industries, died yesterday in Mercy Hospital, Pittsburgh. He was 75. Before his retirement in 1950, he also served 23 years as dean of the School of Engineering and Mines at the University of Pittsburgh.

The dean of men's office has placed two freshmen from the Pollock area on office probation for the remainder of the semester for gambling in their residence hall.

The Association of Independent Men Judicial Board of Review previously recommended office probation for one of the students and disciplinary probation for the other.

The students were found gambling in their dormitory by a counselor. The counselor reported that he had previously caught groups gambling and gave them a "final warning."

The student for whom disciplinary probation was recommended pleaded his case before the University Senate Subcommittee on Discipline. The group voted to reduce the recommendation of the AIM board.
