11 Students Fined By Traffic Court

Traffic Court Monday night levied a total of \$43 in fines against 11 students.

Parking violations amounted to \$22, while failure to register or display a registration sticker amounted to \$20 in fines. A \$1 fine was levied for failure to report to the Campus Patrol office within the next complete school day.

Six fines totaling \$22 were suspended, and will not have to be paid unless the individuals are convicted of further violations.

Automatic fines amounting to \$14 were given to seven persons who failed to appear before the court.

Lecture Methods Questioned

A need for students to shoulder more responsibility for learning course material and an evaluation of the lecture method of teaching were suggested as possible improvements in university teaching in a panel discussion by professors last night.

At a meeting of the American Association of University Professors, Dr. John R. Rackley, dean of the College of Education, moderated a discussion on "Improvement of College and University Teaching."

Panel members were Dr. Jessie Bernard, professor of sociology; Dr. Hugh S. Brown, associate professor of higher education; Dr. Ralph W. Condee, associate professor of English literature; Dr. Hugh M. Davison, professor of

education and Dr. Francis L. Whaley, assistant professor of psychology.

Dr. Bernard cited the need to "slough off the transmission of information as a goal," and put more of the burden of learning on the student. Her statement was supported by several panel members who felt a student can get lecture information by reading a textbook.

Dr. Whaley maintained that content learning is not a real education. He said class participation should enable the student to evaluate opinion and information and organize the course material. He said, however, it makes little difference whether the recitation or lecture method is used where content learning is involved.

A teacher's professional skill, Dr. Brown said, lies in involving the student in the teacher-learning process. He mentioned

the professor's reluctance to change and try new things in course matter as a fallacy.

Dr. Condee, although supporting the importance of lectures for some students, suggested that a closer relationship be established between professor and student. In this way, he said, the student is not afraid to present views and question material.

A stimulation for creative activity was suggested by Dr. Davidson to draw a student into the real meaning behind the course. He said part of the responsibility for the motivation rests on the professor.

Dr. Frederick B. Marbut, professor of journalism, as a member of the discussion audience, favored the lecture method of teaching. He was supported by several others who felt college level students are receptive to interesting lecture material.
