Cornell Prof Will Deliver Chapel Sermon

Dr. Glenn A. Olds, director of the Cornell United Religious Work, Cornell University, will speak on "Awakening Earth" at the chapel service at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

For the service, the Chapel Choir, directed by Willa C. Taylor, will sing "Behold, the Tabernacle of God."

George E. Ceiga, organist, will play as the prelude, Fugue with Choral—Merkel; and as the postlude, Moderato in D Major—Smart.

Dr. Olds is a native of Sherwood, Ore. He is a graduate of Willamette University and has a bachelor of divinity degree from Garrett Theological Seminary, a master of arts from Northwestern University and a doctor of philosophy degree from Yale University.

His teaching experience includes positions on the faculty at Yale, DePauw, Garrett and Northwestern. Before going to Cornell he was University chaplain and associate professor of religion at the University of Denver.

Men Debaters Enter Two Tournaments

Two men's debate teams will participate in tournaments in Boston, Mass., and Morgantown, W.Va., this weekend.

One team will enter the Switch Team Invitational Tournament at Boston University. In this debate each team member will alternate between defending the negative and affirmative positions. They will also enter individual speaking contests.

Won in 1952
The University has not entered since 1955. In 1952 the team won the debate from the 30 competing colleges and universities, most of which were from New England states.

Members of the team are Jonathan Plaut, senior in industrial engineering from Rockville Center, N.Y., and Edward Klevans, senior in electrical engineering from Roaring Spring.

Won Last Year
The second team will enter the North-South debate championship at the University of West Virginia. In this tournament, northern schools debate only southern schools. The University team won the debate last year, and tied for first place in 1955. About 25 colleges and universities enter.

Members of the affirmative team are Jay Feldstein, sophomore in arts and letters from Elizabeth, and Robert Neff, junior in zoology and entomology from Pottstown.

Negative Team Members
Those on the negative team are Robert W. Adams, junior in business administration from Johnstown, and Gerald Bogus, sophomore in arts and letters from Brownsville.

Both teams will debate the national topic, Resolved: That the United States should discontinue direct economic aid to foreign countries.
